- 2 (Judges enter courtroom)
- 3 [09.06.20]
- 4 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 5 The Court is now in session concerning the Santebal, S 21 and the
- 6 Ta Kmao prison.
- 7 The Greffier, please report the attendance of the parties to the
- 8 proceedings.
- 9 THE GREFFIER:
- 10 Your Honours, the President, parties in these proceedings are all
- 11 present.
- 12 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 13 The Greffier, please make sure that the attendance of the parties
- 14 are well included in the transcript.
- 15 To proceed, the Chamber would like to enquire of the parties
- 16 whether they would like to make any further observations, and on
- 17 the 23rd of April there was a document introduced in the Court --
- 18 whether the parties object to how the document is presented or
- 19 would there be any other specific issues the defence or the
- 20 parties would like to raise.
- 21 Mr. François Roux, you can take the floor to address this matter.
- 22 MR. ROUX:
- 23 Thank you, Mr. President. The defence has examined the document
- 24 which was put before the Court by the Co-Prosecutors during the
- 25 last hearing. I am referring to a document which contains a

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- 1 number of photographs and this is what the defence has to say
- 2 about this.
- 3 The defence had understood from the Chamber's previous
- 4 determinations that the parties could request for inclusion into
- 5 the evidence documents in the record of the case, but the
- 6 document which is put forward by the Co-Prosecutors is not a
- 7 document in the record of the case. It is an excerpt of the case
- 8 file and that is entirely different. The Office of the
- 9 Co-Prosecutors has selected, from amongst the documents in the
- 10 record of the case, part of the document and is presenting its
- 11 own selection which is partial and, therefore, necessarily
- 12 biased, before the accused has been questioned.
- 13 The defence, accordingly, requests clarification in this regard.
- 14 For example, with regard to the photographs of the re-enactment
- 15 which is presented in the prosecutor's document, only some of
- 16 those photographs selected by the prosecutor appear in the
- 17 document.
- 18 Does it, therefore, mean that the defence should provide to the
- 19 Chamber the other remaining photographs in that particular
- 20 document?
- 21 [09.11.11]
- 22 We are going to lose time; we are going to waste time. We
- 23 understood that after the Chamber will have questioned either the
- 24 accused or the witnesses, the parties can then tender, or at
- 25 least more accurately, ask that evidence be included in the

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- 1 record. That is evidence that is already in the case file, and
- 2 only at that time the parties can select the evidence that they
- 3 will choose.
- 4 The prosecution will choose the documents or the material that
- 5 will support its case and the defence will select the material
- 6 that will support its own case, but what we do not wish to see is
- 7 that the Office of the Prosecutor -- before the accused is
- 8 questioned, before witnesses give testimony -- selects documents
- 9 in the case file and presents them as if they were objective.
- 10 So either the prosecutor puts before the Chamber the entire
- 11 document at the appropriate time or, if he wishes to make a
- 12 selection, he waits for the accused and the witness to give
- 13 testimony. This is the point on which the defence wished to make
- 14 observations and for which it is seeking clarification from the
- 15 Chamber.
- 16 [09.13.49]
- 17 The defence is prepared, even if it is not afforded the same
- 18 human and material resources as the Co-Prosecutor. The defence
- 19 is ready to work to put before the Chamber all the photographs
- 20 and not just a selection of these, but it seems to me that this
- 21 is a pure waste of time.
- 22 I summarize.
- 23 The point at issue here is that the prosecutor is only presenting
- 24 a selection of a document that is in the case file as if it were
- 25 an objective presentation. It is not objective. This is the

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- 1 prosecution's case, and it is premature.
- 2 I hope that I have made myself understood. Thank you very much,
- 3 Mr. President.
- 4 [09.15.17]
- 5 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 6 The Co-Prosecutor will take the floor.
- 7 MR. BATES:
- 8 Mr. President, thank you.
- 9 There are two issues, in the submission of the Co-Prosecutors.
- 10 The first is the Trial Chamber has requested the parties to give
- 11 advance notification of the documents upon which the parties seek
- 12 to rely or seek to have debated contradictorily before the
- 13 Chamber.
- 14 That was the purpose of putting this bundle of documents before
- 15 the Chamber. It was for the assistance of the Court, and it was
- 16 also following something that was said in the preparatory
- 17 hearings -- and I'm sorry, I don't have the exact reference -- it
- 18 was either in the initial hearing or the trial management
- 19 meeting, and I'm having my assistant look at this as we speak. A
- 20 section in which, I believe it was Judge Lavergne who indicated
- 21 that, if appropriate, the parties could put photocopies of
- 22 documents before the Trial Chamber
- 23 for the assistance of all concerned.
- 24 So, firstly, this booklet was intended as assistance for the
- 25 Court.

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- 1 Secondly, it is correct to say that this is a selection of the
- 2 photographs from a larger exhibit in the case file but, forgive
- 3 me if I'm wrong, it is the Co-Prosecutors who bear the burden of
- 4 proving the guilt of the accused and, of course, the
- 5 Co-Prosecutors will seek to put documents before the Chamber upon
- 6 which they rely to support the conviction of the accused.
- 7 But this being a fair, adversarial hearing, the defence can do
- 8 the same for the arguments that they seek to rely. The civil
- 9 parties can select documents, or parts of documents, upon which
- 10 they wish to rely.
- 11 [09.17.46]
- 12 I'm afraid I don't quite understand the time-wasting allegation.
- 13 It would appear to the Co-Prosecutors -- to save time, we have
- 14 focussed on those portions of the documents that we believe
- 15 support our case. The defence are perfectly entitled to do the
- 16 same.
- 17 And, just to close, the Co-Prosecutors have put these documents
- 18 before the Trial Chamber, not with analysis or with conclusions
- 19 because to do so would be -- we would require a Rule 92
- 20 submission. How else are documents to get before the Trial
- 21 Chamber?
- 22 I don't know whether, Mr. President, you've been provided this
- 23 morning with a piece of paper that we have prepared regarding the
- 24 documents that we wish to rely upon in relation to the current
- 25 issue, and the reason that I raise this now is because it might

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- 1 be of assistance to all parties if the Court were to lay down
- 2 firm guidelines in how it wishes the parties to put documents
- 3 before it.
- 4 The document that we've prepared this morning, or one piece of
- 5 paper listing the four documents that we wish to rely on in the
- 6 cross-examination -- I'm sorry, the examination of the accused --
- 7 is one suggestion. If that is acceptable to the Trial Chamber,
- 8 that is what we propose to do from now on; is to give advance
- 9 notice of the documents upon which we rely and that, as I said in
- 10 the beginning, is what we intended to do by providing the bundle
- 11 of photographs and other materials that we did last week.
- 12 But the Co-Prosecutors make no apology for selecting those
- 13 sections of the document which it considers relevant and
- 14 appropriate. The defence are entitled to do exactly the same.
- 15 Thank you.
- 16 [09.20.20]
- 17 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 18 The civil party lawyers, would you like to make any observations
- 19 concerning the points raised by the Co-Prosecutors concerning the
- 20 distribution of the booklet? So would you like to make any
- 21 comments regarding that matter; you can now take the floor.
- 22 MR. WERNER (Speaking in English):
- 23 Your Honour, good morning. On behalf of civil parties Group 1,
- 24 we do support prosecution's submission. Thank you, Your Honours.
- 25 MR. PRESIDENT:

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- 1 Civil party Group 2.
- 2 MR. KONG PISEY:
- 3 Thank you, Mr. President and Your Honours.
- 4 I would like to make some more observation concerning the
- 5 document of the Co-Prosecutors; and I support its position; and I
- 6 would like to respond also to the defence counsel.
- 7 I know that the defence counsel has lots of experiences
- 8 concerning the burden of proof, and the burden of proof is the
- 9 responsibility of the Co-Prosecutors, so all the documents
- 10 related will be raised and presented for that purpose. And the
- 11 defence counsel stated that this kind of document is perceived as
- 12 biased, but if we think that the Co-Prosecutors bring all the
- 13 burden of proof and also both the exculpatory and inculpatory
- 14 evidence, they would be overloaded; so only the defence counsel
- 15 who is in charge of finding the exculpatory evidence.

- 17 When it comes to the wasting of time in bringing these documents,
- 18 I think it is not appropriate to say so because it is the effort
- 19 of every party involved, and the prosecution is not exceptional
- 20 because he or she tries their best to bring all those documents
- 21 and the time to bring this evidence is not, I can see that as a
- 22 waste of time.
- 23 That's all my submission. I'm grateful, Your Honour.
- 24 THE PRESIDENT:
- 25 Civil party lawyers Group 3, you can take the floor now.

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- 1 MR. KIM MENGKHY:
- 2 Thank you, Mr. President and Your Honours.
- 3 On behalf of civil party Group 3, we do not have any observations
- 4 regarding these matters at this moment, and we would like to
- 5 leave it to the Chamber to make a decision.
- 6 I'm very grateful, Your Honour.
- 7 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 8 Civil party Group 4, you now can take the floor.
- 9 [09.24.09]
- 10 MR. HONG KIMSUON:
- 11 Thank you, Mr. President and Your Honours.
- 12 For me, as the representative of civil party Group 4, I would
- 13 like to make an observation.
- 14 First, I would like to strongly support the motion of the
- 15 prosecution.
- 16 Second, I think that the document submitted on the 23rd of April
- 17 has nothing that can be questioned regarding the delay of the
- 18 proceedings because these documents have already been placed in
- 19 -- have already existed, even during the investigative phase,
- 20 including the documents in the case file.
- 21 To me, I think these documents help speed up the proceedings, and
- 22 it can also clarify the position of the proceeding so that the
- 23 Chamber has nothing to delay the proceedings because by this
- 24 justification of having those documents both in Khmer, in French
- 25 and English, and they are well explained already, that the

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- 1 documents aim to assist the party and Judges to consider the case
- 2 so that all parties, including the accused himself, is well
- 3 informed of the documents.
- 4 [09.25.47]
- 5 So I, therefore, can conclude that the defence counsel has
- 6 participated in both the investigating phase and he also visited
- 7 the S-21. So in civil law system, the party has the right to
- 8 include these documents, including the Co-Prosecutors and also
- 9 the civil parties.
- 10 Now, it depends on the Chamber itself whether it accepts or
- 11 regards these documents as admissible or not. So I would like
- 12 the Chamber to consider accepting these documents.
- 13 Thank you.
- 14 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 15 The floor is yours, Mr. François Roux.
- 16 MR. ROUX:
- 17 Yes, Mr. President, the defence has consulted the transcript of
- 18 the hearing -- of the pre-trial hearing of the 15th of January
- 19 2009, page 66 of the French transcript, line 16 of the French, it
- 20 is said:
- 21 "On this occasion that the Chamber indicated that taking account
- 22 of the fact that it had the duty of conducting the proceedings,
- 23 it had the prerogative of presenting evidence."
- 24 [09.28.02]
- 25 In any event, this is what we understood as being the way the

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- 1 proceedings would be organized. Accordingly, it seems to me, as
- 2 I said before, that it is premature on the part of the
- 3 prosecution to tender such a document even before the Chamber has
- 4 examined the accused. And it was not fair to tender this
- 5 document while indicating that it was a document in the case
- 6 file, whereas as the Co-Prosecutor has admitted it is a selection
- 7 of documents in the case file. That is entirely different.
- 8 But today, the Co-Prosecutor has distributed to all parties and
- 9 participants a leaf or a piece of paper on which he indicates the
- 10 documents that he intends to rely on today. I think this is
- 11 useful for everyone. He had indicated beforehand what he intends
- 12 to be -- put before the Chamber; that is four documents. That's
- 13 very good. The defence has no objection.
- 14 But the other day, the prosecutor tendered beforehand what is not
- 15 a document in the case file but a selection of what is in the
- 16 case file. That is what is surprising to the defence.
- 17 Thank you.
- 18 (Deliberation between Judges)
- 19 [09.32.38]
- 20 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 21 After having heard the observations of the defence counsel
- 22 regarding the list of documents submitted by the Co-Prosecutors
- 23 on the 23rd of April 2009, we noted also the submissions by the
- 24 Co-Prosecutors and civil party lawyers. The Chamber still
- 25 maintains its position to object the defence counsel regarding

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- 1 the submission of this document.
- 2 The details of our decision will be made during the break.
- 3 As for other documents raised by the Co-Prosecutors and having
- 4 not been contested, then the documents can be raised.
- 5 Next, we would like to proceed to the questionings regarding the
- 6 scheduled fact, so to begin with we would like to invite the
- 7 security guard to bring the accused to the dock.
- 8 MR. WERNER:
- 9 (Microphone not activated)
- 10 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 11 What is your problem? You need to even seek permission first
- 12 before you can address the Court.
- 13 MR. WERNER:
- 14 I tried specifically to do this. There is one thing that civil
- 15 party group number 1 would like to bring forth, with your leave.
- 16 [09.35.08]
- 17 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 18 You now take the floor then.
- 19 MR. WERNER:
- 20 Thank you, thank you.
- 21 Mr. President, on Wednesday, April 22nd, which was last
- 22 Wednesday, as you know, the accused started stating about the
- 23 establishment of S 21 and he was examined by yourself and he was
- 24 also examined by Judge Ya Sokhan. And the next day, on the 23rd
- 25 of April, last Thursday, at the beginning of the hearing my

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- 1 colleague, Maître Roux, asked the accused to be allowed to
- 2 clarify one of his answers, and Mr. Roux said the following -- I
- 3 would like to refer to the transcript of last Thursday, page 3 --
- 4 and he said the following, I believe:
- 5 "I think that there is again an interpretation problem. After
- 6 having assessed with the accused the situation, I would like him
- 7 to re-specify what was said concerning the horizontal
- 8 communication or the vertical communication within DK. "
- 9 Your Honours, Mr. President, the accused in this hearing will be
- 10 called upon to testify directly and to answer questions several
- 11 times, and you have decided in your order of the 20th of March
- 12 2009 and each time -- and it's Rule 90.1 of the Internal Rules --
- 13 and each time, the Judges and then the Co-Prosecutor, and then
- 14 the civil party lawyers, and then the defence lawyers, will be
- 15 able during the hearing to ask all of the questions or ask for
- 16 all of this necessary specifications that they wish.
- 17 [09.37.08]
- 18 And this is simply what I want to say here. We believe that this
- 19 dialogue between the accused on one hand and all of the parties
- 20 must take place during the hearing and not outside of the
- 21 hearing; and we do not believe that when the accused is
- 22 expressing himself from the dock and answers questions, that one
- 23 of the parties should, after the hearing, assess the situation
- 24 with the accused on parts of the case file that are specifically
- 25 being discussed during the hearing itself.

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- 1 In order to be clear, therefore, we are not asking -- we're not
- 2 asking that when the accused answers questions -- we're not
- 3 asking the defence not to speak with him outside of the hearing.
- 4 Let me please repeat so that it be clear. We are not asking that
- 5 when the accused is in the Chamber and answers questions that he
- 6 may not at all communicate with his lawyers. That's not what
- 7 we're asking. That's not what we're asking. We're not saying
- 8 that, and my colleagues know this very well.
- 9 There is, concerning this specific point, a recent decision that
- 10 was taken from the Appeal Chamber for the ICTY in the Peric case
- 11 on September 5th, 2008. And then it's stated that an accused
- 12 must be able to discuss with his lawyers at any time during the
- 13 trial, including when he is testifying in the Chamber, and we
- 14 have no problem with this but, however, in these hearings since
- 15 the parties can specifically -- and again I'm referring to Rule
- 90(1) -- ask all of the questions and ask for all of the
- 17 clarifications that they wish during the hearing.
- 18 We are, therefore, simply asking that during the -- while the
- 19 accused is testifying and answering questions, we are simply
- 20 asking that no parties, including the defence, assess the
- 21 situation with the accused outside of the hearing and speak to
- 22 him about things that he said during the hearing.
- 23 And, once again, the reason is the following. It's stated in
- 24 Rule 90.1 and it states that it is in the hearing itself that
- 25 these questions have to be asked and answered.

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- 1 That's what I would like to submit. Thank you, Mr. President.
- 2 [09.40.07]
- 3 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 4 I note your presence, Mr. François Roux.
- 5 MR. ROUX:
- 6 Thank you, Mr. President.
- 7 In order to clarify things that might interest the common law
- 8 jurists here, we are here in a civil law proceeding and my
- 9 colleague erred when he said that the accused is testifying. In
- 10 a civil law proceeding you might have observed, my learned
- 11 friend, that the accused does not testify. He does not take an
- 12 oath. So, therefore, the rules that you're bringing up are
- 13 indeed rules that we know and that we have seen before
- 14 international criminal courts in which common law is applied.
- 15 And I discovered these rules at -- following which, indeed,
- 16 during the period in which an accused is testifying, the defence
- 17 cannot bring up with him, indeed, the hearings; what was
- 18 discussed during a hearing. That's true in common law, indeed.
- 19 Yes, indeed, we are in a civil law trial. That is -- and in a
- 20 civil law trial, my learned friends, nobody -- nobody will
- 21 prevent me from speaking to my client about anything that's
- 22 happening during a hearing and, therefore, to provide him all of
- 23 the recommendations I feel that are suited.
- 24 These are our professional rules and I would be betraying my oath
- 25 if I did not proceed this way. I would be betraying my oath as a

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- 1 lawyer if, during the adjournments, I did not go speak to my
- 2 client about what is being said during the hearing. Once again,
- 3 he is not a witness in this trial. He is an accused in the way
- 4 civil law understands it and he needs, therefore, to be able to
- 5 speak freely with his lawyers on all of the points brought up.
- 6 I think that these precisions were necessary. Thank you, Mr.
- 7 President.
- 8 [09.42.57]
- 9 MR. WERNER:
- 10 Mr. President, may I briefly address this?
- 11 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 12 Based on your observation, this is the last matter regarding this
- 13 matter. You can now take the floor, Mr. Alain.
- 14 MR. WERNER:
- 15 Mr. President, we have already discussed as to whether we are
- 16 completely in a civil law system or in a common law system, and
- 17 if the French law system should be followed exactly, and I don't
- 18 think that it's necessary for me to get back to this point. Yes,
- 19 we are following the Internal Rules and the only thing that might
- 20 -- that can direct these hearings are the Internal Rules.
- 21 And the Internal Rules, Rule 90 paragraph 2, states specifically
- 22 -- talks specifically about the questioning of the accused and it
- 23 is this rule that you must follow during these proceedings. And
- 24 what 90.2 says is that the accused is, indeed, authorized and
- 25 answers questions during hearings and all of the parties,

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- 1 therefore, may -- the Judges and then the prosecutors and then
- 2 the civil parties and then the defence -- these parties may ask
- 3 questions of the accused and may ask him for clarifications.
- 4 But what we're simply saying here is that these questions and
- 5 clarifications must take place during the hearing itself, and
- 6 what is the reason for this? What is the reason for asking for
- 7 questions in the hearing itself if every evening they go speak
- 8 with their clients and ask questions of their clients and ask for
- 9 clarifications outside of the hearings? What is the purpose of
- 10 this?
- 11 [09.45.41]
- 12 We're simply saying, therefore, that -- so that Rule 90.2 makes
- 13 sense, while the accused -- if my colleagues wish to answer other
- 14 questions or clarifications, they must do so during the hearing
- 15 and this is the only way to quarantee the integrity of these
- 16 trials, and that's all that we're saying. We're not speaking
- 17 here about French or American -- or French legal systems, we're
- 18 just speaking about Rule 90 paragraph 2, and Rule 90 paragraph 2
- 19 requests that all parties ask questions and ask for
- 20 clarifications during the hearing.
- 21 That's what I wanted to say. Thank you, Your Honour.
- 22 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 23 The Trial Chamber noted this matter and will respond in ruling
- 24 after the break in its deliberation, and then we will come back
- 25 to the party after that.

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- 1 Next, we will go forward with the hearing to ask the questions in
- 2 relation to the establishment of S 21, the facts of the
- 3 establishment of S 21, and the prison at the psychiatric hospital
- 4 at Ta Kmao, and relevant questions made on Thursday and we did
- 5 not finish with all those questions.
- 6 Now, the Trial Chamber will give the floor to Judge Ya Sokhan to
- 7 continue to ask those questions to the accused about the facts
- 8 mentioned about -- yes.
- 9 [09.47.46]
- 10 JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 11 Thank you, Mr. President.
- 12 QUESTIONING BY THE BENCH
- 13 BY JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 14 Q. The charged person, the accused, you said that there were four
- 15 interrogation -- there were the cool group, chewing group, and
- 16 hot group. So who were in the fourth group? Fourthly, the
- 17 female interrogators?
- 18 A. Your Honours, the fourth group, I want to say it was female
- 19 cadres to interrogate the female prisoners.
- 20 Q.In this group, do you have any role to ask the -- to
- 21 interrogate the prisoner?
- 22 A. Your Honours, I have no duty to interrogate any prisoner but,
- 23 in fact, only one case with Koy Thuon that my superior ordered me
- 24 to interrogate personally. Other than that, I did not
- 25 interrogate any prisoner.

- 2 Q.You indicate that in Building A it was the interrogation
- 3 building. Were there any police regulations for the prisoner to
- 4 read before the interrogation?
- 5 A. Your Honours, the police regulation was not belong to S 21 I
- 6 saw on the re enactment day.
- 7 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 8 Please, Judge Lavergne.
- 9 BY JUDGE LAVERGNE:
- 10 Q.Simply to clarify the question that my colleague put forth,
- 11 we're speaking here about policies. Are we speaking about
- 12 instructions, rules that had to be followed? What does this word
- 13 "policy" mean exactly here?
- 14 A. Your Honours, Judge Lavergne, at the time there's a
- 15 misinterpretation. The police -- it is called discipline of
- 16 security. It is fabricated by the Vietnamese troops, those 10
- 17 rules. I objected. It is not politics; it is called discipline.
- 18 BY JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 19 Q. Who was in charge of the military unit? What was its
- 20 functions at the time? Who made the order to that unit?
- 21 A. Your Honours, I indicated that during the investigation stage,
- 22 the military affair was in charge by my deputy, Comrade Hor, and
- 23 now I reiterate what were the military tasks. They were
- 24 including the arrest, the detention. Number 3, it is taking the
- 25 prisoners to Choeung Ek to smash. And number 4, to intervene

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- 1 when there is the insurgence or the attack from outside. Those
- 2 belonged to the military affair from the beginning. I maintained
- 3 it the same but, in addition, when I was so busy to read the
- 4 confessions, when I became the chief regarding the interrogation
- 5 team and the day to day, was managed by Comrade Hor. Comrade Hor
- 6 had no right to read only the confession by the key prisoner.
- 7 This is the order from the superior, but the day-to-day business
- 8 for Comrade Hor's duty.
- 9 In conclusion, I would like to tell you that the criminal duty
- 10 met by Hor was the crime against the death people -- the people
- 11 who were already died. Why I said that, during the Khmer Rouge
- 12 when the four people make decision to smash anyone, the
- 13 subordinate had to arrest, detain, interrogate, torture, and
- 14 smash secretly without any leak of information to their
- 15 relatives. And then Comrade Hor did that job from day-to-day and
- 16 his crimes ordered by the superior and under my supervision, it
- 17 was his task.
- 18 As for myself, as I told Your Honours already, it was related to
- 19 the crime with the -- related to policy to be absolute in
- 20 interrogation to -- I will not object the responsibility. It
- 21 looks -- it was a very severe crime for Hor, but my crime was
- 22 against the people who were in freedom. It affects their
- 23 reputation when they were trusted by the party, and my creation
- 24 of document affected those people.
- 25 It seemed to be fairly long for now, but that's all for my

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- 1 response now.
- 2 [09.56.35]
- 3 MR. TAN SENARONG:
- 4 Your Honours, I ask for your leeway to make remarks. I want the
- 5 accused to provide clarification in relation to the police
- 6 discipline in security office S-21. I would like to ask for Your
- 7 Honours' permission.
- 8 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 9 The request is objected.
- 10 Please, Judge Ya Sokhan, proceed with your question.
- 11 BY JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 12 Q. You said a while ago that Hor was in charge of the military
- 13 unit, but in the organizational chart, mentioned that Phal was in
- 14 charge of military affairs. So what were the relations between
- 15 Phal and Hor at that time?
- 16 A. Your Honours, at this security office there were two tasks.
- 17 Number 1 was the security task. Secondly, was a military task.
- 18 The security task was under my supervision, and the military
- 19 affair was under Comrade Hor.
- 20 Comrade Phal -- I forget his family name, but he was one of the
- 21 cadre; he was the absolute cadre. The word "absolute", I would
- 22 like to clarify that. It was used to refer to anyone who were
- 23 very absolute and serious in smashing the enemy. It means that
- 24 it is someone who absolute to commit the crime.
- 25 [09.59.27]

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- 1 Among the cadres of Division 703 who were transferred to S-21, it
- 2 was Comrade Phal who was the determine to commit the crime
- 3 compared to other cadres. To mention this matter to indicate
- 4 that Phal of S-21 is different from Comrade Pol -- was different
- 5 from Comrade Pol, whose full name Mien Si (phonetic) Pol of M-13
- 6 who was smashed by me and the other superior already.
- 7 Before -- the military affairs which was under the supervision of
- 8 Comrade Hor, he assigned to Comrade Phal to perform for him. He
- 9 was the deputy to Comrade Hor.
- 10 The military task was in charge by Phal -- Comrade Phal who was
- 11 subordinate of Comrade Hor.
- 12 Q.In the military unit, how many units were divided from that
- 13 unit?
- 14 A. The details of the statistics and forces, I don't know much,
- 15 but I would like to divide this into two.
- 16 First, the normal guards who were in charge of guarding the
- 17 victims who were detained at S-21 in the detention. Number 2,
- 18 the special guards monitored by Him Huy; he was in charge of the
- 19 special guards. That's why I would like to make it clear there
- 20 are two different units.
- 21 [10.02.45]
- 22 Q.To be clear, I would like the court official to project the
- 23 document ERN-00154228 on the overhead projector so that the
- 24 accused can see. Could you please zoom in?
- 25 The quards were divided into several groups, and how many groups

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- 1 were there, and how many people were in each group?
- 2 A.I don't know in detail of the forces. I only know that
- 3 Comrade Phal, Comrade Snguon, Comrade Mam (phonetic) and Poch
- 4 were the cadres from the company, and they were transferred from
- 5 the division. Phal was the cadre from the company and Snguon and
- 6 Mam (phone) and Poch also cadres from the company, but I am not
- 7 sure I can remember the other guards.
- 8 As for the special force or guards, first Peng was in charge. He
- 9 himself was the cadre of the company and when he was replaced by
- 10 -- he was in place of Poch, then Huy took turns to become the
- 11 cadre of the platoon for the special force -- or special guards.
- 12 First was Comrade Poch. When Poch was arrested, then Peng took
- 13 charge. Huy was the secretary of the platoon and he was also
- 14 promoted to the company position in charge of the guards.
- 15 So if you look at the left-hand side you can see female cadres
- 16 for interrogating female prisoners. On top was Mot, the wife of
- 17 Comrade Hor. Hor was my secretary. She was the head of the
- 18 female interrogators team, then followed by Khoeurn, the wife of
- 19 Comrade Huy. She was the deputy of that group, female groups.
- 20 And then we have Comrade Ny, wife of Comrade Pon, who was the
- 21 cadre who interrogated female prisoners, and then followed by
- 22 Ran, wife of Trov, and she also was a female cadre who
- 23 interrogated female prisoners. But still I have not included
- 24 Comrade Pouen , the wife of Comrade Meng who was already smashed.
- 25 [10.07.52]

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- 1 So altogether there were five female interrogators in the team.
- 2 Two were smashed and
- 3 Pouen was also smashed when Meng was also arrested. So they were
- 4 all the people in the female interrogating group.
- 5 Q.So what were the duties of the guards or the force?
- 6 A. The guards were tasked with guarding the prisoners, victims
- 7 who were detained at their premises, and they had to provide food
- 8 and some little medicine to the prisoners to keep them alive
- 9 before they're finally smashed -- and also to send victims to the
- 10 interrogators. They guarded them and made sure that the
- 11 prisoners could not abscond and make sure that they did not die
- 12 before the confession was cut off.
- 13 [10.09.48]
- 14 Q.Were the guards classified as inside guards and outside guards
- 15 at S 21?
- 16 A.I think I have not paid good attention to this, but through my
- 17 recollections I may respond as following.
- 18 The normal guards under Poch and Peng's supervision were only
- 19 guarding inside the premises, but for the people who guarded the
- 20 special prisons which were to the south of Ponhea Yat High
- 21 School, the prisoners were guarded by the special force.
- 22 Therefore, Peng's forces guarded inside; the special forces of
- 23 Comrade Huy guarded outside.
- 24 Q.Could you please clarify the special forces? What were they
- 25 assigned to do?

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- 1 A. The special force had the following six tasks. First, to
- 2 guard outside the premises. Two, to wait to receive victims who
- 3 were brought in. Normally, outside units sent victims to be
- 4 detained at S 21. First they delivered them to a house labelled
- 5 as R, or R in English. Now, it is the location where Beehive
- 6 radio station is occupied. Those people received prisoners and
- 7 registered their names and then delivered them to the guards, and
- 8 Huy would take the prisoners to Comrade Peng. After that, Huy
- 9 could be relieved of their duty. So this is the duty of the
- 10 guards: to receive prisoners and deliver them to the guards.
- 11 Third duty, the internal intervention. For example, when the
- 12 enemies grabbed a weapon, then the special force would intervene
- 13 under the supervision of Comrade Hor to fight fiercely to defend
- 14 the unit, the office, and the party at the premises.
- 15 Fourth, if there were any outside intervention these people would
- 16 be ready to defend the premises from the outside intervention,
- 17 but there was none of such intervention from the outside.
- 18 [10.13.47]
- 19 Number 5, sometimes this special force arrested people who were
- 20 made decision -- the people who were already decided by the
- 21 superior to arrest, for example, like in the case of Koy Thuon
- 22 and when Chhim Sam-Aok alias Panng was arrested by the special
- 23 force. So Hor, Comrade Hor, did conduct such of the arrests.
- 24 There were only people and I was the commander, Hor was the
- 25 arrester and Chhim Sam-Aok alias Panng was the victim who would

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- 1 be arrested, and according to the order from Nuon Chea. So the
- 2 special force had the above roles. That's all.
- 3 Q.In the force, the guards unit, were any guards assigned to
- 4 guard at Choeung Ek?
- 5 A.The guards who were stationed at Choeung Ek was part of the
- 6 special force. I just learned that they existed when I was
- 7 introduced to the enactment time because they were responsible
- 8 for digging the pits and buried the corpses. They were living
- 9 with those corpses.
- 10 Q. How many people were in that group?
- 11 A.So far as I remember, there were four people in that small
- 12 unit; three-to-four people who were stationed at that location.
- 13 They were be careful to make sure that people could not see where
- 14 the dead bodies were buried.
- 15 [10.16.48]
- 16 Q.Apart from the interrogating unit and the military unit, were
- 17 there any other units within S 21 structure?
- 18 A. There were other units, numerous units. I may tell about the
- 19 units as following; I may forget some.
- 20 First, the unit in charge of typing. Another one is the unit to
- 21 manage the phone functions at S 21. The third one is the
- 22 photography unit. Fourth, the medics unit. Five, food security
- 23 unit, the unit divided into kitchens -- kitchens for victims and
- 24 kitchen for cadres and combatants.
- 25 And there were small sub-units: the unit to copy the maps. This

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- 1 unit was in charge of making a copy of that big map; the unit in
- 2 charge by Comrade Thy. There was a unit in charge of keeping the
- 3 documents and also the unit in charge of production and
- 4 plantation.
- 5 Q. Who was in charge of the typewriting unit?
- 6 A.That unit was in charge by -- the unit in charge of
- 7 typewriting the copy or the extracts of the confession of
- 8 prisoners. So people in this unit received the confessions from
- 9 Comrade Hor and when, if necessary, I also needed to give the
- 10 confession to them. So they were in charge of typing the
- 11 confessions and maybe other documents, but mainly they only typed
- 12 the confessions. So the most secret confession was not under the
- 13 task of Comrade Huy. My two messengers were in charge: Comrade
- 14 Chhen and Sam, and Hor could not see that most secret confession
- 15 because my messengers were exclusively in charge of such
- 16 confessions.
- 17 [10.21.14]
- 18 Q. The telephone unit for outside or inside communication of S
- 19 21?
- 20 A.Your Honour, the telephones from outside, yes, there was a
- 21 phone call. It was directly to my house. Only one place that
- 22 they call in. That was a special telephone communication; when
- 23 we start to communicate and we push on a button, and the voice
- 24 frequency was changed. No-one could use the pin to listen on the
- 25 line. The phone was changed from the human voice to a technical

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- 1 voice; the connection of the line from my -- the road to my
- 2 house. And the central telephone was in at the office of
- 3 Professor Sen which I marked as B on the Phnom Penh map that I
- 4 submitted. It was the central telephone communication location.
- 5 And inside S 21 there were two types of telephone communication.
- 6 One type, I called it electronic, used by the military people
- 7 with the battery -- two batteries and they -- it was in one of
- 8 the centres. It was used by 10 people -- more than 10 peoples.
- 9 It was not connected to my house because to avoid interference.
- 10 Another telephone, I call it automatic telephone, that I dialled
- 11 by my finger. It was very small. It was about three comm units;
- 12 one at my home, another one at Comrade Hor's home. So when I
- 13 needed to talk to Comrade Hor, I call him through this telephone.
- 14 In conclusion, Comrade Peng was in charge of that telephone
- 15 connected to my house from outside and connected from my house to
- 16 the central, to the automatic phone. In addition to that, he was
- 17 in charge of the electronic telephone but I did not know whether
- 18 he allocated those to which unit or company.
- 19 Q.Was the photograph unit -- how many people were there in that
- 20 unit? What was its task?
- 21 A. Your Honour, the photograph unit, there were about five or six
- 22 people, and the Chief was Sreang. Sreang, I asked him to take
- 23 photo of the victim who were recently arrived. It was Comrade
- 24 Sreang who did the map shot. He was the chief of the group.
- 25 Number 2 was Comrade Song. Comrade Song was in charge of taking

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- 1 photos of those who were sent to the re-education camp at Prey
- 2 Sar.
- 3 Another one was in charge of taking photos, but he was in secret.
- 4 It's Comrade Sry in the special unit, so could you move to the
- 5 special force. So Comrade Sry, he was the deputy secretary of
- 6 the special unit. When Uncle Nuon order to a secure -- so he
- 7 will -- then Comrade Sry who did that photo for him. So this is
- 8 the special force. It was their secret task so the photograph --
- 9 there were two small teams. He was in the special unit, but he
- 10 acted as the photographer.
- 11 Another one was in charge in S-21 was Comrade Sreang. Another
- 12 one who was in charge in Prey Sar was Comrade Song.
- 13 [10.26.05]
- 14 Q. How many people were there in the medics unit and what were
- 15 their tasks at S-21?
- 16 A.I do not know how many people in the medics group, but from
- 17 the beginning Comrade Sam Oeun (phonetic) -- the name, I'm sorry
- 18 I may confused -- but later he was smashed. And then Try
- 19 (phonetic) became the chief.
- 20 The medic unit, initially it was in charge of provide treatment
- 21 to the cadre, but later Comrade Pao use (inaudible) for
- 22 (inaudible) for the diarrhoea, the cadre who was diarrhoea, but
- 23 that medicine composed of arsenic and there's a bad allergy and a
- 24 report -- it was reported to the upper echelon and then he was
- 25 arrested, and later on the cadre who were sick from S-21 sent to

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- 1 Hospital 98 and, finally, the medics there, they had the duty to
- 2 provide treatment for the victim so that they can survive for
- 3 extracting a confession.
- 4 And another role was to produce traditional medicines, so I would
- 5 like to finish the task of the medics now.
- 6 [10.28.25]
- 7 Q.You said a moment -- that they had a duty to produce the
- 8 traditional herbs for S-21. Was it for the cadre or only for the
- 9 prisoner?
- 10 A.Most of the cases, for the prisoner because the cadre were
- 11 sent to Hospital 98 for treatment.
- 12 I would like to tell Your Honour that Hospital 489 was the
- 13 military hospital. It was the code of Professor Son Sen was 89,
- 14 but it was worse to be 98 as the name of hospital.
- 15 O. The food supply unit, how many people were there in this unit
- 16 and what were its duty and tasks at S-21?
- 17 A.The food supply unit, I know very well Comrade Than who
- 18 brought me very often the fruit. The sources of fruit was in Ta
- 19 Kmao and also vegetables and the pig-raisings location was also
- 20 in Ta Kmao. I do not remember how many people were there, and
- 21 they were in charge of pig-raising, and growing fruit and
- 22 vegetable at Ta Kmao.
- 23 And the kitchens unit was divided into two sections: the kitchen
- 24 for the combatants and the cadre of S-21. Those were in charge
- 25 of cooks was Mom, the wife of Mam Nai alias Chan, and those who

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- 1 were in charge of cooking for the prisoners -- the victims who
- 2 were detained at S-21 -- sometimes it was (inaudible); later a
- 3 man and I do not remember, but they were taken from the prisoner
- 4 who do the cooking, and Comrade Than was also in charge of taking
- 5 the food supply from the logistic unit for other unit.
- 6 [10.31.39]
- 7 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 8 The Trial Chamber would like to declare a break for 30 minutes to
- 9 work on its decision and we'll resume again at 11 o'clock.
- 10 (Judges exit courtroom)
- 11 (Court recesses from 1032H to 1108H)
- 12 (Judges enter courtroom)
- 13 [11.08.24]
- 14 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 15 Please be seated.
- 16 The Trial Chamber is now back in session and before we come to
- 17 the hearing the Trial Chamber hereby declares its ruling
- 18 regarding the objections to the books and photographs extracted
- 19 from the case file that were proposed by the prosecutor without
- 20 any analysis or comment, and the Trial Chamber hereby instructs
- 21 all parties that all parties have the right to compile the
- 22 documents, photographs to circulate to the Trial Chamber and
- 23 other parties in the purpose of facilitating the hearing
- 24 procedure.
- 25 In order to facilitate the proceeding, if any party wishes to

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- 1 raise any documents to the hearing, you should give advance
- 2 notice to the Trial Chamber through the greffiers of the Trial
- 3 Chamber. In addition, the observation by the defence counsel --
- 4 my apologies. All parties have the right to propose one or more
- 5 documents for a hearing but the party should not make any
- 6 comments or analysis. The request should specify that the
- 7 document was the original or the photocopy or the extraction of
- 8 the document from the case file.
- 9 To move on our hearing, I would like to invite Judge Cartwright
- 10 to ask questions in relation to the lawyer of the civil party of
- 11 Group 1. Please, Your Honour Cartwright.
- 12 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 13 Thank you, Mr. President.
- 14 Before I commence I would like to correct the English translation
- 15 of part of the President's decision. The translation should be:
- 16 "In order to facilitate the proceedings it would be helpful if
- 17 parties who wished to put documents before the Trial Chamber
- 18 advised the greffiers."
- 19 This is not mandatory. This is something that the parties may do
- 20 if they wish to do. It is not a requirement.
- 21 [11.12.28]
- 22 Now moving back to your comments, Mr. Werner, my understanding --
- 23 which differed slightly from my colleagues' understanding -- of
- 24 your objection was this: You are not suggesting that there
- 25 should be a rule against communication between defence counsel

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- 1 and the accused. Is that correct?
- 2 MR. WERNER (Speaking in English):
- 3 You're correct, Your Honour.
- 4 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 5 Secondly then, what you were objecting to was defence counsel
- 6 summarizing the evidence of -- the testimony of the accused
- 7 before all parties had had the opportunity to put their
- 8 questions. Am I correct in my understanding?
- 9 MR. WERNER (Speaking in English):
- 10 Yes, Your Honour. But in addition it is true that our reading of
- 11 Rule 90 second paragraph is that only on the evidence given by --
- 12 on what the accused is saying during the day of the hearing, only
- 13 about that when he's in the box and answering questions. But
- 14 discussion, there should not be communications at night with the
- 15 defence counsel, and the reason is that the defence counsel is
- 16 allowed to ask any question or clarification the next day or the
- 17 day after, whenever he will have the opportunity.
- 18 [11.14.16]
- 19 So when I answered your first questions, we are not saying of
- 20 course that defence counsel cannot talk to the accused. He can
- 21 talk any time to the accused. We have no problems about that.
- 22 But our reading of Rule 90 second paragraph, our understanding of
- 23 the rationale of this Rule, is that when -- as it is the case now
- 24 -- he's answering questions, until that is done at night he
- 25 cannot discuss what was discussed during the day with the defence

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- 1 counsel and clarify. If the defence counsel wants to clarify,
- 2 ask questions, he can do that whenever he will be allowed to do
- 3 it. That was -- I hope that clarifies your question.
- 4 [11.14.57]
- 5 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 6 Yes, thank you, Mr. Werner.
- 7 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 8 The Trial Chamber noted the remark by Alain Werner and the Trial
- 9 Chamber will take these remarks.
- 10 THE INTERPRETER:
- 11 So there was no translation in French.
- 12 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 13 Please, the defence counsel, if you have any points to make. The
- 14 defence counsel, François Roux, who intended to raise other
- 15 issues, the floor is yours.
- 16 MR. ROUX:
- 17 Thank you, Mr. President. After the clarification provided by my
- 18 colleague, Werner, and before the Chamber making again a decision
- 19 on this issue, I would like indeed to make a few observations.
- 20 We're dealing with a very serious matter that might modify the
- 21 result of the hearings. Once again I can understand perfectly
- 22 well the position expressed by Mr. Werner. Indeed when we are in
- 23 a proceeding -- and I understand that if we are in a proceeding
- 24 in which the accused takes an oath and when we are in a
- 25 proceeding when the accused is being interviewed as a witness,

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- 1 then I can understand Alain Werner's position. But this is not
- 2 the case here.
- 3 [11.18.07]
- 4 The accused is not being questioned as a witness and Alain
- 5 Werner, Mr. Werner, I would like to reassure you I don't only
- 6 speak to my client in the evening, no; I speak with him in the
- 7 morning, I speak with him at every break and I speak with him
- 8 also in the evening because that is my duty as a lawyer. And
- 9 indeed I bring up with him all of the questions that we are
- 10 dealing with in these proceedings.
- 11 So very respectfully, Your Honour Judge Cartwright, indeed I
- 12 understand that she understands these common law proceedings very
- 13 well in which we are not allowed to bring up during the
- 14 questioning of the accused when he is a witness -- we are not
- 15 allowed to bring up his statements. I understand that. I
- 16 respect this system. But when we are in this system, working
- 17 with this system, but it would be disastrous to install this rule
- 18 here now. This rule is absolutely not included in Rule 90
- 19 paragraph 2 and for the mere reason that Rule 90 paragraph 2 did
- 20 not state that the accused has taken an oath.
- 21 Where is it written that the accused is taking an oath? Nowhere.
- 22 So please, if the accused does not take an oath, do not try to
- 23 institute here rules that can stand in tribunals in which the
- 24 accused takes an oath. Thank you.
- 25 MR. PRESIDENT:

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- 1 The Chamber does not allow further debate on the matter. We note
- 2 the remarks made by lawyer Alain Werner and the Chamber will make
- 3 a decision at a later date on this matter.
- 4 Next, Judge Ya Sokhan, you can proceed with questionings to the
- 5 accused regarding the scheduled facts.
- 6 [11.21.10]
- 7 JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 8 Thank you, Mr. President.
- 9 The Court Officer is instructed to project Document 0054228
- 10 again.
- 11 BY JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 12 Q. The accused, in other parts of other units the Chamber notes
- 13 the administration and personnel unit. Who was in charge of the
- 14 unit at S 21? Were there any new staff recruited to work in that
- 15 unit?
- 16 A. The administration and personnel unit did not have new
- 17 recruited staff, but I think I may complicate myself regarding
- 18 this matter. After the establishment of the S 21 I asked for
- 19 permission from my superior, Son Sen, to bring teenagers from
- 20 Sector 31 -- some of them from Sector 31 -- and I was allowed to
- 21 do so from Son Sen because people from the base, combatants from
- 22 Division 703, were peasants regarded as upper middle-class
- 23 peasants where the party did not have good faith in.
- 24 So having established the S 21, after the establishment of the S
- 25 21 I asked to recruit teenagers from Sector 31 from Kampong

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- 1 Chhnang to be included in that unit. There were two truckloads
- 2 of them. Each time there was a truckload of a Chinese truck, so
- 3 there were about two truckloads of them to be recruited.
- 4 So these new staff were requested to be included to that unit
- 5 after the establishment of S 21; that's all. However, the
- 6 personnel and administration unit was supervised by Comrade Thy.
- 7 The registration of the staff personnel when people left and
- 8 entered were included in that documentation, supervised by that
- 9 person, so there was no recruitment of new staff but there was a
- 10 transfer. For example, the transfer of Comrade Ling (phonetic)
- 11 from the special force to the company of the guard. So they
- 12 registered clearly who were arrested and when.
- 13 But the staff at S 21, from the very beginning when I was
- 14 conducting investigations, there was no list of S 21 but, in
- 15 principle, the list existed.
- 16 [11.25.35]
- 17 Q.Regarding the recruitment of children and teenagers to work at
- 18 S 21, in which part were they assigned to take their duty?
- 19 A. Those teenagers were not mature enough to be tasked with any
- 20 duties. When they were arriving I was about to manage them, but
- 21 I was asked later to let these people controlled by the military
- 22 section. So among the about 60 people, I selected some of them
- 23 to be my messengers, so there were three of them that I could
- 24 recruit to become my messengers. Some were my messengers, some
- 25 were the children who were in charge of finding the morning glory

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- 1 to feed the rabbits, but I did not actually deliberately manage
- 2 this unit. So only my messengers could come close, but these
- 3 people were too young to be tasked with important duties.
- 4 Q.At S 21 was there a messenger unit?
- 5 A. There were only four messengers at the whole S 21. Sorry,
- 6 there were five including Comrade Huy Sre, Nun Huy, and Hor has
- 7 one -- had one messenger and I had also a messenger. But the
- 8 other person, who was handicapped, was in charge of receiving
- 9 phone calls, and there would be a phone call then he would run to
- 10 call me to answer the phone and prepared documents.
- 11 So regarding the messenger unit, there was no unit at all. Nun
- 12 Huy, Hor and I myself had personal messengers, but there was no
- 13 unit.
- 14 Q.In the administration and personnel unit, you said that there
- 15 was the person named Thy. Was he in charge of managing documents
- 16 at S 21?
- 17 A. The victims who were detained at the prison were recorded by
- 18 Thy. Thy kept all the records of both victims and the personnel
- 19 at S 21. So the staff and the personnel and victims'
- 20 registration was in the hands of Comrade Thy, but I think it is
- 21 only my assumption because I did not really fully check or kept
- 22 so much for that documents under Thy's supervision.
- 23 [11.29.40]
- 24 Q.Did you remember how many people were there in that unit?
- 25 A.I don't really want to know about who -- or how many people

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- 1 were in the unit because each day I paid so much attention in
- 2 reading the documents and annotated the documents so that they
- 3 can be sent to the upper echelon so that I could get their
- 4 advice, and with that kind of task I had been so busy already
- 5 that I could hardly complete the task properly.
- 6 Q.You said that in other units there was a unit to copy a map.
- 7 What was it assigned or designated for at S 21?
- 8 A. The mapping is more a technical task and I liked technical
- 9 works. That's why we brought the map to be copied, and we put a
- 10 glass and then laid the map under that table -- under the glass
- 11 on the table, and then we used the pencil to trace the map. It
- 12 is aimed -- it was aimed to train people or staff to be able to
- 13 copy the map, and then we could use the map in our presentation
- 14 in the training sessions. And Pol Pot asked S 21 to copy the map
- 15 and then make a cover of the map and laminate the map so that it
- 16 could be sent through Pung (phonetic) to the upper echelon.
- 17 So at the beginning, it was only to train staff and persons at S
- 18 21 to know how a map worked, but later on we were asked to even
- 19 copy the maps to be presented in sessions -- training sessions.
- 20 [11.32.18]
- 21 JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 22 The Court Officer, could you please project the document with ERN
- 23 number 00154229.
- 24 BY JUDGE YA SOKHAN:
- 25 Q.Could you please clarify if you look at the organization chart

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- 1 of -- the first organization of S 21 and the second
- 2 organizational chart, why were they different? Why was the first
- 3 chart replaced by the second one?
- 4 A.The change of this organizational structure was due to the
- 5 fact that the upper echelon decided to arrest Comrade Nun Huy
- 6 from the field, according to the incidents reported by S 21.
- 7 After the head -- after arrested the key person, Comrade Hor,
- 8 then Phal, was to replace that position. And Peng at that time
- 9 was also promoted to a level to be in charge of the military
- 10 unit.
- 11 Phal -- Comrade -- went to the fields exclusively. Here you can
- 12 see Phal, who was at Prey Sar exclusively. He was in charge of
- 13 correction of three combatants, of ill-disciplined combatants,
- 14 and also in charge of production and plantation at that location.
- 15 Phal here was not the quy from M-13 who had been smashed earlier,
- 16 so Phal still lives and then he left to the countryside and I
- 17 later on introduced or sent him to Ta Mok.
- 18 [11.35.32]
- 19 Now, coming back, regarding your question concerning the chain of
- 20 organizational chart. At Prey Sar, at the beginning when Phal
- 21 was not yet in charge and then there was a change, when Nun Huy
- 22 was arrested it was -- he was arrested one month before
- 23 Vietnamese came. It was on the 7 December 1978, maybe six or
- 24 seven; so it was one month before Vietnamese came in.
- 25 And then I assigned the work at the fields, I did not really

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- lassign it to Hor any longer, then I went personally to that
- 2 location. So Phal had to be accountable or to answer directly to
- 3 me. As you can see the structure here and the reason of the
- 4 chain, I reported to Uncle Nuon, or Nuon Chea, and I had to
- 5 implement according to the request.
- 6 Regarding Phnom Penh task, Hor was exclusively in charge. At the
- 7 beginning Hor was guilty of compromising the confession in which
- 8 the implication was regarding to Brother Pon, the secretary of
- 9 the east. And then Pon already deceased, then Hor was in charge
- 10 -- placed by me to in charge all matters in Phnom Penh. All kind
- 11 of affairs were under his exclusive supervision.
- 12 So every matters concerned in Phnom Penh had to be gone through
- 13 Hor while Phal had to answer to me regarding matter of Prey Sar.
- 14 I personally attempted to distance myself from S-21; that's why I
- 15 changed this structure. I said -- and I have to say again that I
- 16 did not want the police work, and after the 30th of April I asked
- 17 I be transferred to industrial section but Son Sen did not agree
- 18 and after Nat was removed if I asked if Chhay Kim Huor could be
- 19 in place of Nat. But Son Sen warned me how big was S-21, how --
- 20 why did not I take that position?
- 21 [11.38.44]
- 22 And then, taking this into account and then after Huy was
- 23 arrested, I said that I would like Hor to be in charge of S-21 as
- 24 a whole. Then Brother Nuon -- Uncle Nuon Chea threatened me. He
- 25 said that don't forget the chief of S-21 was me; he said that.

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- 1 And then I could know that -- I could not distance myself.
- 2 So the reason we changed -- or I changed the organizational chart
- 3 was to make sure I can distance myself from S-21. But after all
- 4 I knew that it's just a matter of time when my turn to be
- 5 arrested would come.
- 6 Q.So I want to go back a little bit. On the 23rd of April 2009
- 7 you said that the organization chart was prepared by yourself and
- 8 there was no influence from anyone. But your response at the
- 9 Co-Investigating Judges, you said the organizational chart was
- 10 decided by the upper echelon. Which response is correct, based
- 11 on the Document 00154222, line number 2? It is the document of
- 12 the Co-Investigating Judges.
- 13 A.I would like to tell Your Honour that I did not quite
- 14 understand your question but I try to respond based on my
- 15 recollection.
- 16 I said that it has no influence from anyone; it means that the
- 17 organizational chart -- it was done in accordance with the
- 18 assignment where myself and Comrade Hor prepared with the
- 19 authorization from Uncle Nuon; Nuon Chea. So I said there was no
- 20 influence from anyone, it was there, and so Comrade Phal was not
- 21 assigned, so Uncle Nuon did not say that, so I assigned Comrade
- 22 Phal. He was the military and he had his force there, how many
- 23 hundreds.
- 24 [11.42.10]
- 25 So the terms I say, there was no influence from others, it was

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- 1 prepared in accordance following in the equivalent manner to
- 2 replace Huy by Comrade Phal but there was no influence and after
- 3 we completed we reported to Uncle Nuon. He agreed to that
- 4 preparation. This is based on my recollection.
- 5 Q.Did the first -- the chart and the second chart was approved
- 6 by the upper echelon?
- 7 A.It was not. This is decided in detail, it was only the
- 8 appointment of Comrade Phal to replace Comrade Huy. It was
- 9 decided by the upper echelon before we proposed that we have a
- 10 discussion in our committee.
- 11 MR. YA SOKHAN:
- 12 Mr. President, I have no more questions.
- 13 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 14 The Court Officer, please show the Document 00153467 on the
- 15 screen.
- 16 BY MR. PRESIDENT:
- 17 Q. The accused please look at the document and please indicate
- 18 that, whether it is submitted by you to the Co-Investigating
- 19 Judge.
- 20 A. Your Honours, this document was prepared by myself and I
- 21 submitted it to the Co-Investigating Judge.
- 22 Q.Can you indicate the locations on the map which indicate the
- 23 office, the house, detention house, interrogation place and your
- 24 house at that time? Where was it, where is it? And this morning
- 25 you replied to Judge Ya Sokhan in relation to R location, which

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- 1 is now is the Beehive radio station. Can you elaborate a bit
- 2 more detail on the location on the map?
- 3 A. Your Honour, Mr. President, thank you for Your Honour that you
- 4 raise this question again, because on the first day I went very
- 5 fast. This is location A. Location A from the beginning it was
- 6 a few numbers of victims were detained there and interrogated
- 7 there. It's on the corner of Road 360 and 163 and it's the
- 8 interrogation is right here, it's on the road here but I forget
- 9 the number of the road.
- 10 [11.46.20]
- 11 At that time I was not married. I stayed in house number 1 here.
- 12 House number 1, as far as my recollection, is on Road 143. As I
- 13 told to Your Honour earlier, it was the old house of Chea Kim Eng
- 14 which is rented to UNDP. Nat ordered me to stay there and the
- prisoner was on the corner of Road 360 and 163.
- 16 So at that time I thought there was only the prisoner, but after
- 17 reading the document there were other prisoner were at Ta Kmao.
- 18 As I told Your Honours earlier, Nat moved the interrogation place
- 19 and the training for interrogation moved to the P.J., it is the
- 20 general inspectorate. We don't have that on the map. Nat no
- 21 longer allowed me to stay here -- and please move a bit backward
- 22 on the screen.
- Yes, house number 2, it's on Road 302 or Road 306. The
- 24 interrogation was trained at house number 2. As I told earlier,
- 25 house number 2 it was the villa of Dr. Mey Samedi. And later the

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- 1 superior ordered me to move out of P.J. and I was no longer at
- 2 house number 2. I placed the victims for interrogation at
- 3 location A; location A here. However, my house was no longer
- 4 there. I moved to -- it was not my house. It was my office
- 5 after my marriage and I stayed at a small house. It's right on
- 6 the ground, only one-grounded house on number 3. A flat.
- 7 [11.49.11]
- 8 My photo with Comrade Sok was on the veranda before that house.
- 9 I stayed there for a while and I decided to move detention and
- 10 interrogation to location B. It is in the compound of the land
- 11 of Ponhea Yat High School so that it is easier to detain, and
- 12 interrogation, and also to avoid any escape, and I asked
- 13 permission from the superior, as I told Your Honours earlier.
- 14 However, in the south of this location was the prisoner, for Pon
- 15 to interrogate the important prisoner. That's what I told Judge
- 16 Ya Sokhan this morning the special unit people guarding there.
- 17 And talking about my house and offices moved from one place to
- 18 another until I went to number 7 (inaudible) here at the corner.
- 19 It was the communal kitchen of the cadre and the combatants.
- 20 I might be confused about the road. It was the place where Hor
- 21 received the truck sending the victims to be detained at S 21.
- 22 It was at R. I do not know what R means. So I heard it is now
- 23 R. It was Sambok Khmum radio station now. This is
- 24 the location R. And later on my house is replaced more
- 25 frequently, but the prison and interrogation location were not

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- 1 moved. I spent the most of my time -- it's on house number 7 on
- 2 Monivong Boulevard. It was 7 Prime. It's number 7 here.
- 3 Opposite is my office. These are my details to Mr. President
- 4 about this location.
- 5 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 6 So to the corner of 163 and 360, location A -- please move the
- 7 map on the screen to location A.
- 8 BY THE PRESIDENT
- 9 Q.On the map there is a double E on the map; English double E.
- 10 What was the location for at that time?
- 11 A. Your Honour, EE here, from the beginning it was a Protestant
- 12 church called Bethlehem Church. From the beginning I took this
- 13 location for education of cadre and combatants of S 21, and when
- 14 I organized A, Road 305 next to my house number 7, EE here became
- 15 the place where copying the map was trained.
- 16 [11.53.15]
- 17 Q.Location 1, 2, 3 and 3 Prime, what were they? What were the
- 18 purpose? Were they part of S 21?
- 19 A.1 here, it's the house -- it's my first house and office. I
- 20 reported to Your Honour that it's the old house of General Chea
- 21 Kim Eng. Number 2, it was a house and my office when the
- 22 location for interrogations stationed at P.J. Number 2 was a
- 23 former house of Dr. Mey Samedi. Number 3, it was my office when
- 24 the interrogation location moved to location A. However, my
- 25 house after my marriage -- my wife moved from Longveaek to live

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- 1 with me. I stayed with my house -- at my house 3 Prime at the
- 2 street 163.
- 3 BY MR. PRESIDENT:
- 4 Q.So these are the locations you used to stay and work there and
- 5 after you left the place, you turned the place to be the office
- 6 or to be the detention/interrogation location during the
- 7 operation of S-21 at location A. Is it correct?
- 8 A. Your Honour, house number 1, no one will interrogate there and
- 9 number 2, we gave to Pen Huot. It is the permanent committee who
- 10 informed me to go out, and number 3 when I move out, it was left
- 11 vacant and number 3 Prime also left vacant after I left. And
- 12 from location A to P.J. and from P.J. to B and from A to B, it
- 13 was moved for the location of interrogation and detention.
- 14 Q.Now come to the A's to Monivong Boulevard, and you mark as
- 15 numbers 5, 5 Prime, 6, 6 Prime. So what were those places used
- 16 at the time?
- 17 A. Your Honours, the Prime is a mark for the house where I stay
- 18 and the number without Prime it was offices, number 4. When I
- 19 work at office number 4, my house I live with my wife in 4 Prime.
- 20 And when I was working at office number 6, my house with my wife
- 21 was 6 Prime. And then number 6 when I move out, it became the
- 22 interrogation place for Vietnamese prisoner interrogated by Mam
- 23 Nai. So when I moved to work at number 5, number 5 Prime it was
- 24 my house. So when I moved to office number 7, my house was on
- 25 number 7 Prime.

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- 1 [11:57:15]
- 2 Number 7 Prime here it was the place where Koy Thuon was sent,
- 3 number 7 the place where Nun asked Peng to get into number 7 and
- 4 then he ordered me and Hor to arrest.
- 5 Q.In the structure of the state institution as what S-21
- 6 belonged to, did it belong to the national defence industry or it
- 7 belonged to the civil industry or did it belong to the security?
- 8 A. Your Honour, in the practical implementation, S-21 has to
- 9 position -- it's like it had two legs. It was a unit of the
- 10 general staff; it consider as the battalion and independent
- 11 regiment. The logistics we get from the general staff. The
- 12 force resource also we are content with the general staff. Rice
- 13 production also contacted with the general staff, and the medics
- 14 was under the general staff.
- 15 [11:58:58]
- 16 In addition to that, the annual study session in which myself,
- 17 Comrade Hor and Comrade Huy were sent to study under the general
- 18 staff until 1977. We were sent to a study session at the general
- 19 staff. This is one leg of S-21.
- 20 Another leg of S-21 regarding security tasks, S-21 was to receive
- 21 the people who were decided by the permanent committee. No-one
- 22 has no authority to send anyone to S-21. It's only myself to
- 23 receive the list of names or the names from the standing
- 24 committee and then the lower echelon would act on that. It's
- 25 only the people were sent by the standing committee, then we can

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- 1 receive. If it was not sent by that committee, we will be
- 2 committing a mistake and then we will be beheaded.
- 3 Number 2, the reports by S-21, we did not have any authority or
- 4 any right to report to any other place. We could not report to
- 5 the division to -- we could not report to any other industry. We
- 6 had to report to the standing committee and if you made any wrong
- 7 report, we will be beheaded. These are the principle that we
- 8 perform there.
- 9 There were a lot of documents to prove this statement. I have
- 10 the intention to tell Mr. President here regarding the documents
- 11 that I report directly to the standing committee, so if -- with
- 12 your leave I will report, I will tell this to Your Honour.
- 13 [12.01.27]
- 14 Q. You are allowed to put to us the documents you mentioned.
- 15 A.First, I would like to pick up the report of Yi Luy about the
- 16 activity of Mean, Phen and Sophan. Mean is Chann Chakkrey. Phen
- 17 is --
- 18 THE INTERPRETER:
- 19 Excuse me, the interpreter cannot really follow. Could you
- 20 instruct the accused to repeat these for the record? When he
- 21 talk about names, could he slow down a little bit?
- 22 BY THE PRESIDENT:
- 23 Q. There are a lot of documents and it will be time-consuming to
- 24 work on the documents and since we're running out of time
- 25 already, we wouldn't take a break, a lunch break.

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- 1 But before the break, the Chamber would like to inform the
- 2 accused that you can still present this document in the afternoon
- 3 session, but please make sure that you read the names of the
- 4 people concerned clearly and slowly so that the interpreters can
- 5 deliver the service fully and also for the purpose of good
- 6 record.
- 7 The Chamber is adjourned for lunch and resumes at 1.30.
- 8 The parties to the proceedings, come back before 1.30. The
- 9 security personnel are instructed to take the accused back to the
- 10 detention facility and bring him here before 1.30.
- 11 (Judges exit courtroom)
- 12 (Court recesses from 1204H to 1338H)
- 13 THE GREFFIER:
- 14 Please stand up.
- 15 (Judges enter courtroom)
- 16 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 17 The Court is now back in session. The security guard are
- 18 instructed to bring the accused to the dock.
- 19 Next, the accused can proceed with the reflection of some of the
- 20 documents related to the reporting forms of S-21 to the Standing
- 21 Committee so you can now take the floor.
- 22 [13.39.36]
- 23 THE ACCUSED:
- 24 First, I would like to report about Yi Luy who had relation to
- 25 Mean, Phan, and Peng -- correction Phal. This document is found

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- 1 in B32/4.
- 2 First, I would like to touch upon the ERN-00173044. May the
- 3 President instructed the court official to project it on the
- 4 projector so that it can be shown.
- 5 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 6 The court official is instructed to put that document on the
- 7 projector.
- 8 THE ACCUSED:
- 9 Before I describe about this, I would like to tell you that the
- 10 person concerned here is called Yi Luy; Yi Luy's confession. He
- 11 was the military cadre of division in the east.
- 12 This confession had something to do with the person named Mean --
- 13 his name is Chann Chakkrey, and Phan, the revolutionary name of
- 14 Ly Phel, the general military staff of the east zone, and then so
- 15 Phan, the Deputy Secretary of Division 170.
- 16 [13.42.51]
- 17 The reason I would like to emphasize on this is how the
- 18 confession was recorded, and how the report was conducted. So on
- 19 the top left-hand side of the page, you may see my handwriting.
- 20 This copy is to be sent to Brother Khieu directly so that Brother
- 21 can examine at first because I annotated a few points for you to
- 22 be able to understand, with respect.
- 23 The reason I raised this issue before the Chamber because I would
- 24 like to indicate that the annotation on the confession, I had to
- 25 contact with my superior on a daily basis.

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- 1 And next -- the next page, which is 00175145 -- correction
- 2 00173145 still in Document D32/4, I would like the court official
- 3 to only zoom into my annotation written by me into my annotation
- 4 written by me.
- 5 To respectful Brother, one, this confession is a base; two, there
- 6 has been some confusion because the internal cadres, including
- 7 Brother Sok and Sao, included Brother Sok who was the deputy --
- 8 who was the Secretary of 170 and then he was suspended and then
- 9 the Party appointed Brother Sok as the Secretary and then Brother
- 10 Sao was appointed as a Deputy Secretary.
- 11 [13.45.11]
- 12 I would like to repeat; there has been confusion. He included
- 13 internal cadre and mixed them up with CIA agents and some
- 14 insiders, enemy.
- 15 Three; we have already asked for the confession to be typed but
- 16 it has not been done yet. So this document, the genuine
- 17 communication to my superior had to be done in this form so that
- 18 he could be well informed of the situation.
- 19 I would like to conclude my report concerning this document
- 20 concerning how the annotation was made.
- 21 Next, may I be permitted to present Document 00204310 until
- 22 002043110? This document is hard to read. I requested that the
- 23 Chamber allow the original document in colour.
- 24 THE PRESIDENT:
- 25 The Chamber allows such a document to be shown on the projector.

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- 1 THE ACCUSED:
- 2 This document indicates how I reported to my superior. The first
- 3 step was to report to Son Sen, so this is my writing.
- 4 Dear Brother: One, the forces reported here were people from
- 5 Sector 22, including those in the revolutionary line or rank and
- 6 network of Kok Minh Taing at Pea Reang, two, the senior forces,
- 7 the highest forces that implicated was A Tum. I repeat, the
- 8 highest -- the most highest force implicated was A Tum. A Tum
- 9 was Brother Siet Chhae or Brother 81. Before he was arrested he
- 10 was the deputy of the General Staff.
- 11 [13.48.51]
- 12 Three; Comrade Eang Sipheng, he said he was the person who
- 13 followed the revolutionary. Luy Muy alias Chhuon told us that he
- 14 was not involved in the CIA.
- 15 So this is how I reported to my superior concerning the forces
- 16 from Sector 22 at Pea Reang and I had to report this to him on 11
- 17 of -- sorry, correction -- the 15th of October 1977. So this is
- 18 about the history of the traitorous activity of Luy Muy alias
- 19 Chhuon.
- 20 This document, completed on the 2nd of September 1977, after
- 21 having received my document my superior noted that he look at his
- 22 writing. He said that it would be important, first. Number two,
- 23 this guy has a network with the Chinese immigrants to be in
- 24 translation. Section three; I have not read it yet, I would like
- 25 Brother to read it first.

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- 1 So this is the words where my superior referred or sent to
- 2 Brother Pol and he made such an annotation on the 17th of October
- 3 1977.
- 4 I would like to move to the left-hand side of the page, on the
- 5 top. Look at the term -- in particular Khieu section had to
- 6 contact the east. So this is the writing of Brother Pol. Pol
- 7 Pot made a decision for Brother Khieu and Son Sen to contact the
- 8 east regarding this document.
- 9 [13.51.34]
- 10 Can we move to the check on the right-hand side like a V letter.
- 11 This is a sign made by Pol Pot. So after reading any document he
- 12 would then check like that. After having received the document
- 13 my superior, Son Sen, said the document was already sent on the
- 14 11 November '77. So it means he already sent the document to the
- 15 east already on that date.
- 16 This document indicates that I, the Chairman of S-21 reported
- 17 directly to the superior, to Son Sen and from Son Sen to Pol Pot,
- 18 then Pol Pot asked Son Sen to contact the east.
- 19 I would like to conclude my report on this document.
- 20 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 21 The prosecutor, would you like to make any observation?
- 22 MR. BATES:
- 23 It's simply that we don't have an ERN number for this document;
- 24 we don't know where it comes from. It looks like it's contained
- 25 in a booklet and of course we'd all be interested to find out the

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- l source for this document. And if there is an ERN number or a
- 2 document number can it be read into the record, please.
- 3 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 4 Judge Cartwright, you may now read the ERN numbers to the public,
- 5 as referred in the ZyLAB.
- 6 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 7 Yes, the ERN number that the accused read out, 00204310 produces
- 8 that page in handwriting, as we have seen it shown by the Court
- 9 official. It appears to be part of a much longer document and
- 10 it's in Khmer so I can't help you any more than that.
- 11 [13.54.05]
- 12 MR. BATES:
- 13 Your Honour, just to reply; it seemed that there were two
- 14 different documents. The first document was the document number
- 15 that I noted down at the beginning. No, I'm sorry, I correct
- 16 myself.
- 17 The first document was a black and white document and this
- 18 coloured document, is that the document with the ERN number that
- 19 Your Honour has just read it?
- 20 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 21 No, I was wondering where the original came from because what is
- 22 on ZyLAB is the black and white one, the ERN number -- I'm going
- 23 slowly -- the ERN number which I have given to you. So we need
- 24 to find out where the original with the red ink annotations comes
- 25 from.

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- 1 MR. BATES:
- 2 Yes, please. Thank you, Your Honour.
- 3 [13.55.09]
- 4 MR. ROUX:
- 5 Thank you, Mr. President. We have an index D93/3 with an ERN --
- 6 a Khmer ERN number for the Khmer document, 00204310.
- 7 And in fact this document is -- the coloured document is included
- 8 in an answer that the accused provided upon a civil party
- 9 request. And it's indexed in the context of this answer and the
- 10 index is D93/iii, but three in Roman numerals. D93/iii, and
- 11 three in Roman numbers; that's the index number.
- 12 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 13 Please, Judge Lavergne?
- 14 JUDGE LAVERGNE:
- 15 Must I understand that in the file there's only a black and white
- 16 version and that the accused was able to address the civil party
- 17 by including a coloured document? I don't really understand.
- 18 MR. ROUX:
- 19 During an interview Judge You Bunleng provided this coloured copy
- 20 to the accused as what was happening often during the
- 21 investigations when documents were being provided to the accused
- 22 so that he may comment them.
- 23 And it is therefore this coloured copy that later on was used to
- 24 address a question that was raised by one of the civil parties
- 25 and therefore it was indexed D93/iii. But originally it is the

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- 1 Co-Judge, Mr. You Bunleng, who provided this copy during an
- 2 investigation sitting.
- 3 [13.58.02]
- 4 BY MR. PRESIDENT:
- 5 Q.Next, the accused may present the other document in relation
- 6 to the reporting regime in S-21, regarding to the standing
- 7 committee.
- 8 A. Your Honour, President, a while ago I reported about a
- 9 document of S-21 reporting to the standing committee and the
- 10 standing committee would then forward it to the zone and in
- 11 particularly to the East Zone.
- 12 The following, I would like to present another document which I
- 13 reported to the standing committee but the standing committee
- 14 just circulated and made decisions amongst the committee. It is
- 15 number ERN 0017300 -- 00173000. It is D32/iv. I noted to the
- 16 superior on the 11 of January 1977, "Respectfully Brother One,
- 17 this contemptible are most of the time talking about the
- 18 substantive".
- 19 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 20 The Court officer, please display the document on the projector.
- 21 BY THE PRESIDENT:
- 22 Q. The accused, please go ahead.
- 23 A. This is my annotation to my superior, Son Sen, regarding the
- 24 confession of Heng Pich alias Chhan. My annotation is that:
- 25 "Respectfully, Brother, this contemptible most of the time is

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- 1 talking about a contempt, about the secret stance of activity,
- 2 about a stance of struggling for everlasting in order to conduct
- 3 infiltration, especially in the CPK.
- 4 [14.01.25]
- 5 One, this contemptible often said more about the context, the
- 6 substance about the secret stance, about the stance of
- 7 everlasting stance in order to infiltrate the Communist Party of
- 8 Kampuchea."
- 9 Number two; regarding the member of KGB which he implicated, he
- 10 said that he extended to another member, named Seang Ho Long,
- 11 he's the new KGB agent named Seang Ho Long, respectfully dated
- 12 the 16 of January 1977."
- 13 This is my annotation to my superior. When he received this
- 14 document he noted. This indicated that this document was
- 15 circulated and worked out in the standing committee. It is in
- 16 ERN 00172999 D32/iv.
- 17 On the top he said "secret" This is my superior writing, Son
- 18 Sen; this is notes right beneath. Number one; this document lead
- 19 us to understand about the infiltration plan espionage, the
- 20 building of treacherous force of the recidivism. Number one;
- 21 this document lead us to understand about infiltration plan, spy,
- 22 plus the building of treacherous activity of the recidivism.
- 23 Number two; to understand well about the treacherous network,
- 24 especially about Pra Seth in this case we pay more attention to
- 25 the case of -- Pra Seth is the brother of Chuon Mom --

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- 1 understood well a number of the assignment treacherous network,
- 2 especially in the case of Pra Seth. Pra Seth, in the previous
- 3 case there was the reply or the response that he recommended the
- 4 KGB to continue its activity. Based on my opinion we should pay
- 5 more attention and we should allow him to work on anything which
- 6 is not related to the foreigner.
- 7 Number 3, he said that he built up one member, Seang Ho Long, a
- 8 former economics engineer from East Germany and nowadays he is in
- 9 the civil aviation sector. Haksieng Lainy was the superior, the
- 10 big superior who led every activity dated 19/1/77. Son Sen
- 11 receiving that document and he made the annotation and circulated
- 12 among the Standing Committee and it was Son Sen who reported to
- 13 Pol Pot. The note, this note of Son Sen, is to Pol Pot.
- 14 [14.05.57]
- 15 MR. BATES:
- 16 Just for the record and also for the assistance of all the
- 17 parties when we come to look back on the transcript, the
- 18 documents we've now understood the accused to be producing are
- 19 from Document D32/iv but in that case document there are over 100
- 20 annexes which refer to individual colour copies of confessions.
- 21 And for the assistance of Your Honours and all parties, if the
- 22 accused can state the number of the annex. This appears to be
- 23 Annex 18 to which he has just referred, but if we can be precise
- 24 and specify the annex number as well it would be of great
- 25 assistance in a later stage.

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- 1 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 2 Mr. François Roux, the floor is yours.
- 3 MR. ROUX:
- 4 I have D32/iv Annex 18 and an ERN number for the French, which is
- 5 00224083; for the French translation.
- 6 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 7 The accused, please continue to present your documents.
- 8 THE ACCUSED:
- 9 Mr. President, the next document, just to indicate that I was the
- 10 one who reported to Son Sen or to Uncle Nuon, and later to Uncle
- 11 Nuon and he circulated, and the document is D43/4 ERN 00174100.
- 12 This document is the confession of Meas Touch, alias Kem, a
- 13 former ambassador of Cambodia to Laos. This is the title about
- 14 the history of the traitorous activity. I made the annotation to
- 15 the upper echelon that respectfully, Brother, his activities in
- 16 Laos were two: one, with the imperial leaders it connected to
- 17 the organization of HCR with In Tam to solve, to withdraw the
- 18 Cambodian from Laos regarding the emigrant from Laos. HCR is one
- 19 part of the UN. It is the High Commissioner for Refugees.
- 20 [14.10.00]
- 21 Number 2, with the Yuon, the Vietnamese, he worked closely with
- 22 the ambassador of Vietnam named Daniel Lim, and the foreign --
- 23 the Official of Foreign Affairs of Laos, Phoun Si and the
- 24 Vietnamese needed to use the migrant Cambodians in Laos for their
- 25 activities. So 9/2/78, based on the date, and I took this

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- 1 document to report to Uncle Nuon. It was no longer Son Sen
- 2 because he left for the battlefield.
- 3 His activity in Laos he wrote from page 37 onward. This is my
- 4 annotation. On the top left there is a few letters to Comrade
- 5 Vann. This is the writing of Nuon, so Nuon Chea. So my purpose
- 6 to tell you about the document, the document is -- that's all.
- 7 There are a number of documents but I have another document too.
- 8 [14.11.37]
- 9 MR. BATES:
- 10 Mr. President, we note the record for the previous document is
- 11 Annex 41. Thank you. We've identified that from our database.
- 12 It's just easier for all parties to have both the ERN number and
- 13 the annex number. I'm sorry, Your Honour.
- 14 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 15 You said the previous document. You said that was Annex 18. Do
- 16 you mean this document that we're looking at now?
- 17 MR. BATES:
- 18 Yes.
- 19 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 20 It's Annex 43?
- 21 MR. BATES:
- 22 41.
- 23 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 24 41.
- 25 MR. BATES:

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- 1 I'm sorry, I believed the accused to be going on to another
- 2 document, so I was referring to the document he'd just mentioned.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 So if, please, Mr. President, the accused could be reminded or at
- 5 least his defence counsel could be reminded to specify the annex
- 6 number as well as the ERN number, that would be of great
- 7 assistance to all parties when we come to review this evidence.
- 8 Thank you.
- 9 [14.12.44]
- 10 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 11 There seems to be an inconsistency of how we understood, as I
- 12 observed. I think the accused has already shown all the ERN
- 13 numbers, related ERN numbers, or would you like the accused to
- 14 present the ERN number in three languages including the French,
- 15 the Khmer and the English version before he could proceed?
- 16 Because he seems to be precise with the ER numbers for all the
- 17 related documents he presented, and all his words have been well
- 18 recorded in the transcript, as we believe.
- 19 MR. BATES:
- 20 Mr. President, there is no problem with simply referring to ERN
- 21 numbers when the first page is the ERN cited by the accused. But
- 22 if the accused selects an ERN number that is in the middle of the
- 23 group it's difficult, in fact impossible to find, on the ZyLAB
- 24 system without the annex number. I hope that translates
- 25 effectively enough, but the annex number is the category of

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- 1 documents.
- 2 I see my learned friend getting to his feet. Perhaps he can add
- 3 something too.
- 4 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 5 The defence counsel, you take the floor.
- 6 [14.14.28]
- 7 MR. ROUX:
- 8 Thank you, Mr. President.
- 9 Our document is at D32/4, Annex 41, to confirm what the
- 10 prosecutor says. For some of the index numbers, there are many
- 11 annexes, so this document is in fact Annex 41, and to our
- 12 knowledge there is no translation either into English or to
- 13 French of this document.
- 14 Thank you.
- 15 [14.15.22]
- 16 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 17 Q.Once again, if the ERN number is raised, then there would be a
- 18 problem then. To clarify, as the defence said, the document was
- 19 document 43/4 and, later on, if the accused intends to refer to
- 20 the document could he be instructed to refer to the Annex as
- 21 well?
- 22 Now we may proceed.
- 23 A. The next document did not have my annotation, but there was
- 24 Son Sen's annotation, but it was a document from S-21, Document
- 25 D32/4, ERN 00172986. I would like to only raise this first page

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- 1 to present to you.
- 2 It is about the history of a person who entered a free Khmer
- 3 through Loem Pheng Tong Heang from 1968. So this is the title of
- 4 the confession of Mom Voeun, alias Muny, Division 290. The role
- 5 of Mom Voeun, alias Muny, was in the company.
- 6 We would like to also present to you the annotation of my
- 7 superior concerning the arrest and the arrangement of the tax
- 8 which were done by Son Sen.
- 9 So the management of the security for the military unit at the
- 10 central office was already stated on the decision of the 9th of
- 11 October 1975.
- 12 I would like to read the annotation of this document to Comrade
- 13 Pal and Nan, 27th of October 1977. So all tax I had to report to
- 14 my superior and the superior then made sure the document be sent
- 15 to Brother Pal, the secretary of Division 290, and Nat, who was
- 16 the former chairman of S-21.
- 17 Nat was removed from S-21 to be the assistant to the army chief.
- 18 So the decision made to smash people in the division, the Central
- 19 Division, was done was done by Son Sen, according to the document
- 20 dated on the 30th of March 1976. It indicated clearly this
- 21 matter; the general staff made such a decision. So S-21
- 22 reported, but the general staff made such a decision.
- 23 [14.19.46]
- 24 MR. ROUX:
- 25 Mr. President, this document is also registered under D32/4, and

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- 1 this is Annex 9 under this index number. The ERN Number in
- 2 French is 00289864.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 5 Q. The documents related to the reporting regime concerning the
- 6 operation of S-21 is coming to an end but my -- our question is
- 7 that the reporting regime, concerning the daily activity or
- 8 weekly or monthly activity of S-21, was there any reporting
- 9 regime arranged at S-21 and reported to the superior? If there
- 10 was, then how was it done?
- 11 A. The interrogation task and report about the confession
- 12 extracted through tortures have already been stated. However,
- 13 the activities in our unit, I did not report in writing to my
- 14 superior because my superior met me very often. So when I meet
- 15 -- I met him, I would then report about the activities in the
- 16 unit, partially before we came to discuss the matter of security.
- 17 So the monthly or weekly reports was not done on a regular basis;
- 18 only when I met him, then I would report to him, upon on our
- 19 meeting, that -- that's short.
- 20 Q. The structure drawn by you before the Co-Investigating Judges
- 21 concerning the management structure at S-21, you indicated that
- 22 there was a link of S-21 to S-24 which was Prey Sar. So when the
- 23 S-21 was initially established was S-24 or Prey Sar was included
- 24 in the plan, and by way of copying the structure of M-13 or what
- 25 would it be?

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- 1 [14.23.38]
- 2 A.First, I would like to emphasize on the M-13A and B. First,
- 3 there was only M-13 alone. Then, having noted that I did not
- 4 want prisoners -- sorry -- guards who released the prisoners,
- 5 also people detained and shackled and smashed, that's why I made
- 6 a request to establish M-13B and it was agreed by Vorn Vet, and
- 7 Vorn Vet fully agreed with the request but S-21 itself was a unit
- 8 the Standing Committee of the Central Committee created and I was
- 9 the Deputy Chairman.
- 10 Before S-21 was established there was M-03 supervised by Nat.
- 11 Then when Nat left I did not know whether there was S-24, I
- 12 didn't know.
- 13 [14.25.15]
- 14 Then during the investigation phase and after many years passed I
- 15 did not even know what S-24 were. Then I had to recall to what
- 16 happened and based on the document S-21 was recognized by the
- 17 Party.
- 18 The Standing Committee only recognized S-21 alone and Huoy
- 19 attended a meeting, agricultural meeting at the -- on behalf of
- 20 S-21, not S-24. So to recall it, Nat wanted the unit to become a
- 21 big ministry and S-22 was the Ta Kmao Prison, S-23 was the
- 22 plantation where fruits were planted and S-24 was Prey Sar
- 23 because at that time there was no Choeung Ek yet.
- 24 So I have to admit that crimes did not only happen in Phnom Penh
- 25 but it happened elsewhere. However, there was only Prey Sar

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- 1 which was the S-24. So all together Nat unofficially created
- 2 S-24 but it was under my supervision anyway, although I was not
- 3 of -- any knowledge of that office.
- 4 BY MR. PRESIDENT:
- 5 Q.Now we move to another facts in relation to the Ta Kmao prison
- 6 and the prison located on the psychiatric hospital at the Ta Kmao
- 7 and you presented some of the details but it was not clear. The
- 8 question is did you know the prison at the psychiatric of the Ta
- 9 Kmao -- this morning you said about that prison, so when was it
- 10 established?
- 11 A.Mr. President, M-03 or the police office of 703 Division, it
- 12 was located in Ta Kmao. As I told you, the psychiatric hospital
- 13 at the Ta Kmao and the Ta Kmao plantation and the special prison
- 14 in -- at the Sisovat Monireth residence for detaining the special
- 15 prisoner; all together it is called the police office of Division
- 16 703, it was created from the beginning regarding the Ta Kmao
- 17 prison. Yes, that's all.
- 18 [14.28.46]
- 19 Q.It mean that you are not clear about the existence of Ta Kmao
- 20 Prison. Was it established after the liberation in 1975 or right
- 21 before that?
- 22 A.Ta Kmao was liberated on the 17 of April 1975. It was created
- 23 about two or three day after the liberation.
- 24 Let me indicate; based on my observation, add military unit
- 25 502650 their only role is to erase the former official of Lon Nol

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- 1 for smashing, especially Division 703 to conduct the search of
- 2 Sector 23, including Sok Butchamroeun, Neou alias Sok and Huot Se
- 3 alias Bun Than were the members. And therefore the internal
- 4 purge in the Party and in Division 12, it was known as Division
- 5 12 -- right after the 17 April, in the meantime when the former
- 6 military official and the former civil servant were arrested to
- 7 detain in the Ta Kmao.
- 8 Q. You told us this morning that based on your understanding
- 9 when you were dealing with the establishment of S-21, and it is
- 10 now called Tuol Sleng compound, you believed that those who were
- 11 detained in the psychiatric hospital, the prison and there were
- 12 many prisoners; is that true, the accused?
- 13 A.I am not clear how many but a few of them were brought there
- 14 for interrogation and later at P.J. and P.J. was the place where
- 15 I taught the people to do the interrogation and a large number, I
- 16 don't know how many but I did not enter into that prison.
- 17 [14.31.34]
- 18 Q. Earlier you said that -- about the assignment of your deputy
- 19 to organize and to exhume the ashes of the victim before you
- 20 transfer to the Social Affair Department. My question is that
- 21 when he did the exhumation for the ashes of the victim and to
- 22 burn out, so did he found many of the victim or how many of them?
- 23 A.Mr. President, I did not go there. After two week they
- 24 reported to me -- they report to me that that's all, only two --
- 25 only two pits remained un-exhumed.

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- 1 I believe at that time and then I report it to the superior and I
- 2 report to the superior that, Brother, the place were completely
- 3 exhumed except the two grave and then it was silent and during
- 4 the investigation stage I recall that -- oh, at that time maybe
- 5 Comrade Hor failed to exhume all the pits and then in the
- 6 document of investigation, Investigating Judge or the prosecution
- 7 saying that were marks of crime there. But I can say that I
- 8 order Comrade Hor to do the exhumation and he did that and he
- 9 reported to me but I do not get the detail information about how
- 10 many victims but -- from -- I made the report and he report to me
- 11 it's about half month of work.
- 12 Q.You said that there were two remain un-exhumed; it's two pits
- 13 or two graves?
- 14 A.It was two victim under the dike. It's not two pits, two
- 15 dike.
- 16 [14.34.05]
- 17 Q.Could you try to recall the date when you transfer the
- 18 psychiatric hospital to the Ministry of Social Affairs; when was
- 19 that happen? ...
- 20 A.I take one date as the basis. It was the 15 August 1977 as
- 21 far as I recall. It was the day when Uncle Nuon came to replace
- 22 Son Sen to supervise me, and he told me that Son Sen went to the
- 23 battlefield, and if I take this date as the basis, it was a bit
- 24 earlier than that. It's about four or five months; I'm not
- 25 clear. It was before Son Sen left me, so that's my recollection.

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- 1 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 2 Your Honours, do you have any questions to pose to the accused
- 3 regarding the facts that we address in this hearing?
- 4 Please, Your Honour Judge.
- 5 [14.35.36]
- 6 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 7 Yes, thank you, Mr. President.
- 8 BY JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 9 Q.Just one final question about Ta Kmao Prison, please.
- 10 I'm not clear -- you may have given the answer, but I am not
- 11 clear -- it was originally a psychiatric hospital. Is that
- 12 correct?
- 13 A.Yes, Your Honour. During Norodom Sihanouk's regime it was
- 14 Sunmom (phonetic) Psychiatric. In Lon Nol it might be remained a
- 15 psychiatric hospital. It's only in the Democratic Kampuchea.
- 16 Nat has turned that into his prison. Yes, that's all I can
- 17 remember.
- 18 Q.(Microphone not activated) of the 17th of April 1975. Is that
- 19 correct?
- 20 A. Your Honours, this is my analysis and my conclusion. At that
- 21 time, I was at Amleang. This is just my conclusion, my analysis
- 22 based on the facts remaining in the document that I read.
- 23 Q.Yes I understand that you don't have personal knowledge but I
- 24 would like to ask one more question, please. Do you know what
- 25 happened to the psychiatric patients at that hospital? No

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- 1 French translation?
- 2 THE INTERPRETER:
- 3 We don't have the French interpretation?
- 4 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 5 Apparently not.
- 6 [14.37.40]
- 7 JUDGE LAVERGNE:
- 8 If I may, I think we are facing problems because I think the
- 9 questions overlapped, so they were not all translated in French,
- 10 so we don't know where we are right now.
- 11 So would you perhaps repeat not the last question but the one
- 12 before that?
- 13 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 14 Yes. The earlier question that I put to the accused was to ask
- 15 him if it was correct that Ta Kmao Psychiatric Hospital was taken
- 16 over as a prison within a few days of the 17th of April 1975.
- 17 And the accused, noting that he had no personal knowledge of
- 18 that, confirmed that that was his understanding from the
- 19 documents he's reviewed.
- 20 BY JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 21 Q.My next question is, noting that you have no personal
- 22 knowledge of the first period of the Ta Kmao Prison, do you know
- 23 what happened to the psychiatric patients at that hospital?
- 24 A. Your Honours, this is also my conclusion and my analysis.
- 25 The fate of those patients in that psychiatric hospital, I do not

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- 1 know whether they were released or they were smashed at the time.
- 2 I am not clear, but I would like to give you my analysis in
- 3 comparison to those who get leprosy. In Sector 15, those leprosy
- 4 people were smashed, ordered smashed, and the upper echelon
- 5 ordered to smash all those who get leprosy, so the leper.
- 6 And the victim, I'm more than 15 percent that all the patients at
- 7 the psychiatric hospital were smashed, based on my repeated
- 8 analysis. This is, again, my conclusion and my analysis but I
- 9 cannot guarantee it is correct or incorrect. Thank you.
- 10 [14.41.02]
- 11 Q.Yes, thank you.
- 12 I now have a brief question about the Vietnamese detainees who
- 13 were brought to Ponhea Yat High School, and I refer to ERN
- 14 00153575, which is the map of the layout of the buildings at S
- 15 21. You said that the Vietnamese were interrogated to the east,
- 16 but I did not understand at what part of the site they were held,
- 17 detained and interrogated. Can you clarify that, please?
- 18 A. Your Honours, I know only the interrogation location. I gave
- 19 house number 6 for Mam Nai to interrogate the Vietnamese and a
- 20 studio was installed there. And a detention facility, it might
- 21 be in Building B, C, D of Ponhea Yat High School. I don't --
- 22 clear about which one was the one to detain the Vietnamese
- 23 prisoners.
- 24 Q. Thank you. I want to turn finally to the fate of the female
- 25 interrogators who were assigned to interrogate women detainees at

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- 1 S 21. You gave us an organizational plan, 0000154228, and I
- 2 think in that plan you listed four women interrogators. Do you
- 3 recall that?
- 4 A. Your Honour, the female interrogator cadre, there were five of
- 5 them, but when I prepared the organizational chart I forget one
- 6 comrade. It was Comrade Poeun. Comrade Poeun was arrested by S
- 7 21, smashed because her husband was smashed; her husband named
- 8 Mein.
- 9 And later, S-21 received an order to smash Comrade Huy, Huy at
- 10 the rice paddy, Huy is there and another Prok Khoeun. And only
- 11 three of them remain. Number 1, Comrade Mot. Number 2, Comrade
- 12 Ny, the wife of Comrade Pon. And Mot was the wife of Huor.
- 13 Before -- I'm sorry. Before Mot married to Huor, comrade Mot was
- 14 the cadre of the battalion of the sewing unit.
- 15 When she was sent to S-21, I assigned her to be the chief of the
- 16 squad in charge of interrogating female prisoner. At that time,
- 17 Huor was also there. And another one, Comrade Ny, the wife of
- 18 Comrade Pon. And both of Ny and Pon was still -- still survived
- 19 there.
- 20 One was Comrade Ran. She was not survive because of Trov but
- 21 Trov was survived because of Ran because she have an uncle of
- 22 Sector 31 of the West Zone. Her uncle was a big man from Peam,
- 23 his name was Yoem, he was from Kampong Tralach or Kampong Chhnang
- 24 and until the 7 of January 1979, only three female interrogators
- 25 were still alive.

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- 1 [14:46:41]
- 2 BY JUDGE CARTRIGHT:
- 3 Q.In summary, wives of trusted cadres were selected to be
- 4 interrogators, but when their husbands were no longer trusted and
- 5 were themselves detained, the wives were also detained and
- 6 smashed. Is that the summary?
- 7 A. Your Honours, Mr. President, this is the true, the regime of
- 8 smash; when the husband is smashed, the wife would end up the
- 9 same.
- 10 Q.(Microphone not activated) for bringing two truckloads of
- 11 teenagers and children from Kampong Chhnang to supplement the
- 12 staff at S-21. You said that some of those were assigned to be
- 13 messengers, but that was only about five of them. What did the
- 14 other children or teenagers do at S-21?
- 15 A. Your Honours, five of them who were assigned to work in S-21
- 16 were all not from Kampong Chhnang. The messenger of Nun Huy from
- 17 Sector 25 from Sa Ang Koh Tom (phonetic); Comrade Tha, the
- 18 messenger of Hor was also from Sa Ang Koh Tom; another Muy, my
- 19 messenger, lost one hand is from 703.
- 20 My only messenger who was selected from among the children and
- 21 used Kampong Chhnang was Comrade Tan. He was from Kampong
- 22 Chhnang from Sector 31. And Comrade Chhen. Chhen was from
- 23 Amleang from Trapeang Traok. I selected him since 1973.
- 24 [14:49:20]
- 25 These are the situation of the five messengers of the three of

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- 1 us: myself, Nun Huy and Hor. I selected three of them who were
- 2 from Kampong Chhnang. First, I selected Comrade Sum. The
- 3 children from Kampong Chhnang but I observed that he is not -- he
- 4 was not qualified to be trusted and then I transfer to Comrade
- 5 Hor to educate so that he can be a guard.
- 6 And then I selected another one. Name -- his name was Comrade
- 7 Mao and then when I found he is not qualified, I reverted to Hor,
- 8 and finally I select Comrade Thann and three messenger from
- 9 Kampong Chhnang, only one, only Thann remained my messenger.
- 10 These are the people from Kampong Chhnang and only three of these
- 11 people, and another one who met me at Somlaut, Comrade Tuy. He
- 12 told me that he want the children to collect the morning glory to
- 13 feed the rabbit, and they were 50 of them about 12 years old and
- 14 two youths or teenagers who was from 17 or below 17. But I don't
- 15 know the name of others people.
- 16 But I would like to tell you that among the 60 people from
- 17 Kampong Chhnang were the same as people from Amleang. No one can
- 18 arrest or do any hurt to them because they were from their good
- 19 class of the society. The class protected them at the time,
- 20 that's all I can say.
- 21 [14:51:56]
- 22 Q.So, in summary, most of those children and teenagers from
- 23 Kampong Chhnang worked looking for morning glory to feed the
- 24 rabbits; one or two were messengers; and that's what they did for
- 25 the whole time they were at S-21. Is that correct?

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- 1 A. The work to look for morning glory to feed the rabbit is part
- 2 of the task and I'm not sure to -- of that task. But as I told
- 3 you, Tuy approached me in Samlaut and said that he was the former
- 4 child who worked to look for the water -- morning glory to feed
- 5 the rabbit. So there were only some of them who worked in that
- 6 section to look for morning glory to feed the rabbits, but I
- 7 don't know the other.
- 8 But these people could not be arrested for any offences and no
- 9 one could report them to be arrested because of their good class
- 10 nature.
- 11 Q.Did any of them work as guards, inside or outside guards?
- 12 A.I'm not sure.
- 13 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 14 For the benefit of the French speakers, my question was did any
- 15 of those children or teenagers work as inside or outside quards,
- 16 and the accused says he's not sure.
- 17 Thank you. I have no other questions.
- 18 [14:53:51]
- 19 BY JUDGE LAVERGNE:
- 20 Q.I'd like to get back a little bit to the conditions in which
- 21 S-21 was created.
- 22 If I've understood correctly, S-21 -- the staff of S-21 was made
- 23 up of, on the one hand, of elements from the 703rd Division as
- 24 well as from -- elements coming from M-13, but also, if I've
- 25 understood correctly, people who had worked in Phnom Penh before

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- 1 the fall of Phnom Penh and therefore who would have been used as
- 2 information agents, as intelligence agents. Is this so or not?
- 3 A. The translation in Khmer said the spies, which means
- 4 intelligence agents. I think it is not correct in the term of
- 5 your question, because you may repeat your question and I try to
- 6 listen into French.
- 7 Q.I hope that my question will be correctly translated into
- 8 Khmer, above all.
- 9 The question that I was asking regarded the staff of S 21 when S
- 10 21 was established. So which elements made up this staff? If
- 11 I've understood correctly, a part of the staff came from the
- 12 Division 703, another part came from M 13, but it seemed to me
- 13 that part of the staff also came from party members who had
- 14 worked in Phnom Penh before the fall of Phnom Penh and who later
- 15 on had provided information. So did you understand my question
- 16 and can you answer my question?
- 17 A. Your conclusion and your questioning are correct. The S 21
- 18 forces made up of forces from Division 703. There were a lot of
- 19 them and there are other small forces from the Phnom Penh -- from
- 20 the city and from M 13, and later on there were more young people
- 21 from Kampong Chhnang. Altogether your question is correct.
- 22 [14.58.15]
- 23 Q. Then we know you explained earlier on that a certain number of
- 24 the staff members of S 21 were victims of purges. So can you
- 25 tell us if among these three components that we just described,

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- 1 that if there were purges in each one of these components do the
- 2 purges -- were they generally directed to people from the 703rd
- 3 Division or from -- was it more directed toward the M 13 staff
- 4 members, or was it more directed towards what I would call the
- 5 city agents from Phnom Penh?
- 6 A.The purge conducted at S 21 Unit affected only the forces from
- 7 Division 703 exclusively and people from Phnom Penh. There was
- 8 only one person left -- people from Phnom Penh, from the city.
- 9 As for people from M 13 were not affected and so were people from
- 10 Kampong Chhnang.
- 11 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 12 The Chamber would like to adjourn for 20 minutes and resume after
- 13 that.
- 14 (Judges exit courtroom)
- 15 (Court recesses from 1500H to 1526H)
- 16 (Judges enter courtroom)
- 17 [15.26.30]
- 18 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 19 Please be seated.
- 20 Do you have any questions, Ms. lawyer?
- 21 MS. STUDZINSKY:
- 22 I would come very briefly to another issue. We wanted to submit
- 23 a document which has a deadline tomorrow. It is a response to an
- 24 application by co-lawyers for civil party Group 1. We have sent
- 25 this document to the translation service, so ICT (sic), on Friday

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- l at noon. Today I received the notice that ITP told us that they
- 2 are not able to translate this document from English into Khmer.
- 3 They indicated that on 29 April it would be possible to have the
- 4 document translated, and therefore I would request the Chamber to
- 5 grant us an extension until 29 April 2009 to submit this
- 6 document. And we'd be grateful to get a decision today because
- 7 we are not able to submit this in writing because, as we know,
- 8 the translation services are not able to translate this request
- 9 into Khmer, and so we would like to take the opportunity to do
- 10 this orally today. Thank you.
- 11 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 12 Please, Judge Cartwright.
- 13 [15.28.54]
- 14 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 15 Thank you, Mr. President.
- 16 Ms. Studzinsky, is this the response to civil party group 1's
- 17 application seeking a direction from the Trial Chamber that when
- 18 a civil party group files documents it should identify which
- 19 group? Well, I presume that your response will be very brief in
- 20 writing.
- 21 MS. STUDZINSKY:
- 22 It is only a two-pages text. It's really a very brief document.
- 23 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 24 Two pages is brief?
- 25 MS. STUDZINSKY:

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- 1 Text with --
- 2 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 3 Can you give us your answer orally now to cut through the
- 4 translation and other problems? What is your response? Can you
- 5 give it to us now orally, very briefly, please? Two sentences I
- 6 should think would do it.
- 7 MS. STUDZINSKY:
- 8 About the content of the document?
- 9 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 10 Yes, tell us what your response is.
- 11 [15.30.02]
- 12 MS. STUDZINSKY:
- 13 The response is that mentioning the numbers, the group numbers,
- on the front page is first not necessary and the document shows
- 15 by naming the lawyers who submit and appear as filing party is
- 16 enough to identify clearly what or from which -- or who submits a
- 17 document.
- 18 And furthermore, that it is rather more confusing to name the
- 19 numbers of the different groups because it occurred already that
- 20 not -- the groups did not share -- or members of every so-called
- 21 group did not share the same opinion, and it happened already
- 22 that parts of one group filed together with another group and so
- 23 on, so that naming group numbers and then the question is should
- 24 it be then Group 2 with parts of Group 3 or 4 and so on, and it
- 25 was more -- or would be more confusing.

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- 1 That is a summary of the content of this document.
- 2 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 Mr. President, may I ask if any other civil party group wishes to
- 5 comment on that response?
- 6 Does any other civil party group wish to comment on that
- 7 response?
- 8 [15.32.00]
- 9 MR. WERNER (Speaking in English):
- 10 Your Honours, we have nothing further. I think our submission
- 11 was summarizing our -- our view summarizing our submission and we
- 12 have nothing further. Thank you.
- 13 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 14 Civil party Group 3?
- 15 MR. CANNONE:
- 16 Yes, Your Honour. Thank you for giving me the floor. Civil
- 17 party Group 3 has no observations.
- 18 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 19 Thank you.
- 20 Civil party Group 4?
- 21 MR. HONG KIMSUON:
- 22 Thank you, Your Honours. I have no observation. I have no
- 23 objection because on the document it specifies the name of
- 24 lawyers. Failure to specify a number of group, there will be no
- 25 problem. More importantly, it's the lawyer who signs the

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- 1 documents. Thank you.
- 2 JUDGE CARTWRIGHT:
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 The Co-Prosecutors, do you wish to comment? No comment.
- 5 Does the defence wish to comment? No? Thank you.
- 6 Mr. President, may I suggest that we accept that summary of the
- 7 response and indicate that we will give our decision orally in
- 8 the next day or two, and ask that the Civil Party Group 2 not
- 9 proceed with its written response.
- 10 [15.33.57]
- 11 MR. PRESIDENT:
- 12 Yes, the Trial agrees to do so.
- 13 Next we move to the hearing of the facts, related facts. Your
- 14 Honour, do you have a further question to ask to the accused?
- 15 Please check, Jean-Marc. ...
- 16 BY JUDGE LAVERGNE:
- 17 Q.Before the break we were talking about the various components
- 18 of the staff of S 21. You said there were three of these. There
- 19 was one from the 703rd Division; that is the largest, and this
- 20 was the victim -- or this contained the largest number of purged
- 21 victims; is that correct?
- 22 I see that the accused has nodded. I do not know whether this
- 23 has been recorded.
- 24 There was another component. This was the one coming from M-13
- 25 which was not purged at all; is that correct?

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- 1 A. (No interpretation)
- 2 [15.35.28]
- 3 Q.I think it would be best for you to respond in Khmer. Please
- 4 do not speak French.
- 5 A.The units who inflicted and who experienced the purge, there
- 6 were two units. I would like to say it again. There were two
- 7 units who were affected by the purge. Number one was Unit 703.
- 8 Another one was those who were from the city. There were a few
- 9 of them who were from the city, but the purge went on and only a
- 10 few people left and Pon, Sokhon (inaudible) and those who were
- 11 from 703, almost all of them were purged.
- 12 As for those who were from M-13; no-one affected. As for those
- 13 young people who were from Sector 31, as far as I remember,
- 14 no-one was affected because no-one there touched these people.
- 15 In conclude, that's all my answer to you.
- 16 Q.So if I understand you correctly, the people from the city
- 17 were all purged before the establishment of S-21; is that
- 18 correct?
- 19 Did you hear me?
- 20 A. (Speaking in French). Yes
- 21 [15.37.40]
- 22 Q.I shall repeat my question. Were the workers from the city
- 23 mostly purged before the establishment of S-21?
- 24 A.The force -- the guard force who were from the city were
- 25 transferred to S-21 after the establishment of S-21 but before

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- 1 Nat has left, and therefore the purge of those people happened
- 2 gradually. Until Nat has left, there were two or three of them,
- 3 and the incidents continued, and almost all of them were finished
- 4 except one left.
- 5 Q.Were these people purged within S-21 proper? Were they
- 6 detained and then executed through S-21? How did that happen?
- 7 A.Yes, Your Honour, the staff of S-21 was arrested by S-21; S-21
- 8 who detained them. S-21 interrogated them, followed by -- with
- 9 torture and finally they were smashed by S-21. It's -- the
- 10 decision was made from the upper echelon. This is the only
- 11 remark I can make.
- 12 Q.Did the same process apply for people coming from the 703rd
- 13 Division?
- 14 A. The process was exactly the same applied.
- 15 Q. Was the decision to bring in adolescents to support the
- 16 personnel taken because the adolescents were considered to have
- 17 good biographies, unlike the staff who had been purged?
- 18 A.It is true as requested by me, myself, to Son Sen and he
- 19 agreed that I can recruit people who -- to find people with good
- 20 biographies, so he approved of that request. That's why when I
- 21 went out to search for them it was my intention to find those
- 22 with good biographies.
- 23 [15.41.34]
- 24 Q.On what basis, and who took the information or who took the
- 25 decision that the staff from the city or staff from Unit 703 did

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- 1 not have good biographies and were to be purged?
- 2 A.I would like to confirm that the staff from Division 703
- 3 included a secretary before Nat who was smashed. That secretary
- 4 was No Pon (phonetic) alias Sok. He was at Division 12 before.
- 5 Then when the chief was smashed, then his subordinates would be
- 6 falling in the same manner. After the key person is smashed,
- 7 then the subordinates were fearful even when they committed small
- 8 wrongdoings.
- 9 Therefore, when these people committed wrongdoings, Hor were
- 10 attracted to their commitment -- to their wrongdoings. He had to
- 11 report to me and if Hor did not report to me and when he made any
- 12 mistake, then he, himself, would be in trouble.
- 13 So when I was reported then I would report to the superior. The
- 14 superior made the decision to smash and I had to follow the
- 15 orders. People from 703 and the people under the supervision of
- 16 Hor were not -- who were under control of Hor were not affected.
- 17 I would like to say again that the unit from Division 703 who
- 18 were the subordinates, direct subordinates of Hor, they were not
- 19 affected. So only those who lost their superiors, those whose
- 20 superior were smashed, then they were no longer trusted by others
- 21 and by me. When I refer to "they" here in this context, it was
- 22 referring to Hor.
- 23 As for people from the city, they came without their superior
- 24 coming along. So the people were not very determined in the
- 25 crimes of interrogation and torturing and they, at any point,

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- 1 contested such attacks. Therefore, by having contested such
- 2 things, Nat was interested to report to the superior.
- 3 These people had been purged before Nat came, and later on Hor
- 4 and I, myself, agreed to report further, and after all only one
- 5 person left. In conclusion, the falling stone or the scapegoat
- 6 in this purging affair was falling on partially people from
- 7 Division 703.
- 8 [15.48.37]
- 9 Q.Correct me if I'm wrong. I understand that in terms of
- 10 elimination or smashing, to use your term, there were rules.
- 11 When a member of a family was arrested and smashed, the other
- 12 members of the family had to suffer the same fate. This appears
- 13 to me to be what you said just now. Do you confirm that?
- 14 A.It is true. So people were purged based on their network and
- 15 family relationship.
- 16 Q. You have also indicated that the principle of purging also
- 17 applied to networks. That means when there was a leader all his
- 18 subordinates had to suffer the same fate. And you said, or
- 19 perhaps I understood you wrongly, that Sok, who was the head, had
- 20 been purged. So I understand that he was the first to be
- 21 eliminated or purged, and subsequently the others were
- 22 eliminated. Is that what you said?
- 23 A.First Sok was purged, it was true. Then when he was purged,
- 24 his subordinates were monitored and traced by the upper echelon.
- 25 People who were followed or monitored, they would not be able to

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- 1 escape from being purged as well. So when the superior was
- 2 arrested, it was just a matter of time before his subordinates
- 3 were also arrested. It is the principle.
- 4 [15.52.10]
- 5 Q.That said --
- 6 A.It's Sok who were with Comrade Hor and I, myself. Whenever we
- 7 noticed something we didn't like, for example, the person talked
- 8 back and contested, and if we did not do anything and later on
- 9 there would be consequences on us, and then I had to report to
- 10 the superior, and after that the superior would make a decision.
- 11 I would like to indicate what was the contest that could not be
- 12 -- that was not bearable. For example, people were not allowed
- 13 to beat prisoners until they die and that the confession was cut
- 14 up. People who were arrested because -- due to these incidents,
- 15 there were two so far as I remember; two of them. They were
- 16 Comrade Khoem Phau, cadre from the company, and Comrade Hak. I
- 17 don't remember his last name.
- 18 So if they were perceived to be confronting us, then they would
- 19 be in trouble. So people who were from Division 703 who we
- 20 perceived as confronting or challenged the -- to task, were
- 21 people who were very proud and, too, they liked to show off. But
- 22 having said that, I seem to point the finger to the victims who
- 23 already died.
- 24 We as educators, reporters, we are part in these crimes for sure.
- 25 We did not educate them to be determined in their work but we

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- 1 were so quick to report their wrongdoings and it were part of the
- 2 crimes. I personally was scared when Vorn Vet was arrested. Why
- 3 didn't I see the same when other people, especially subordinates,
- 4 were arrested? I did not even think of that. I only valued
- 5 myself higher than the others at that time.
- 6 So in conclusion, the people from Division 703 and the people
- 7 from the city were the victims. So in conclusion, the reason why
- 8 they were arrested, because of their background. They were
- 9 cadres and they had received the falling stone or become the
- 10 scapegoat, and then we at the same time on top of this trouble
- 11 reported to the superior and they ended up in big trouble.
- 12 So I may conclude the people who were purged at S 21 now.
- 13 [15.58.46]
- 14 Q.When you reported on what you describe as these unacceptable
- 15 acts to your superiors, were you aware that such report meant
- 16 that this staff or these staff members were going to be smashed?
- 17 A.When I reported and then after Comrade Hor also agreed with
- 18 the reports and after all it was for sure that there would be a
- 19 decision to arrest them. First we said that this person belonged
- 20 to these cadres and their acts were classified as this and that.
- 21 And they were educated like this but they did not follow or did
- 22 not learn the lesson, but after they failed to do that and then
- 23 we had to report to the superior, then they would be arrested for
- 24 sure.
- 25 [16.00.02]

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- 1 Q.Well, I'm not sure that you answered my question completely
- 2 but that's not a problem. I wanted to know when these reports
- 3 started being established. Did they start before Nat's departure
- 4 or after Nat's departure?
- 5 A.When Nat was there he was the one who report. In addition
- 6 there is another incident which is fairly long but just to tell
- 7 you one thing. Nat decided to arrest the combatants of the cadre
- 8 of Division 12 and Division 703. He made that decision
- 9 unilaterally. And Nat, sometimes he requests for the advice from
- 10 the superiors. Sometimes he made the arrests without the
- 11 consultation with the superior.
- 12 As for me, after Nat has left I wait until I get the decision
- 13 from the superior. Then I order Comrade Hor to implement.
- 14 Q.Can you tell us what were -- what are, if there are any, the
- 15 fundamental differences in the operational modes between M 13 and
- 16 S 21? What are the fundamental differences in the way M 13 and S
- 17 21 operated, if there are any differences? Did you understand
- 18 the question?
- 19 A.I would like to try to describe one point to another to tell
- 20 to Your Honours. From the beginning I would like to say about
- 21 the same characteristic. The same characteristic was education.
- 22 We received a number of young youth and then we provided them
- 23 with education. The education is aimed at cruelty, absolute and
- 24 very extreme direction. We used the Communist terminology for
- 25 that education. And therefore, in any unit, the education played

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- 1 an important role to make an innocent people to be a cruel
- 2 person.
- 3 The children of the peasants who were good people we trained, we
- 4 educated them to be the combatants and to be the members of the
- 5 Youth League of the Party.
- 6 Therefore, we took the youth and then we trained them so that
- 7 they can adhere the extreme situation that they dare interrogate
- 8 their race, and they're to do anything ordered. For example, the
- 9 youth from Amleang, we took them, we educated them, we trained
- 10 them in the movement, in the cruel movement to kill the people,
- 11 to detain the people. For example, the youth, the combatants
- 12 from Kampong Chhnang, they were young people and then we took
- 13 them and we trained them.
- 14 In reality, those who lived with me I know well, but I can say in
- 15 summary these people changed all of their nature after the
- 16 training or education. They changed their nature. They became
- 17 from the gentle to become cruelty, very extreme in the matter of
- 18 arresting, cursing. and detaining people. They were in the class
- 19 wrath, class anger.
- 20 And therefore, in conclusion, they worked here and there. I
- 21 don't know that but the one who made the education, it was me, to
- 22 turn them to be extreme, to be absolute. It is like that.
- 23 [16.07.41]
- 24 Q.So this transformation; I don't know if I could use the word
- 25 "education" but maybe it's better to say, so this transformation

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- 1 that you're speaking about, it existed at M-13 and it continued
- 2 at S-21. The same transformation process continued at S-21. So
- 3 were there other points of similarity between S-21 and M-13, or
- 4 are there differences? Or for you, what happened at S-21, was it
- 5 the continuation of what happened before at M-13?
- 6 A. Your Honours, the nature in which S-21 continued from the
- 7 nature implemented in M-13, and the education and the training of
- 8 the youth to the direction of crime and cruelty, it was the same
- 9 in nature. Secondly, the interrogation methods with torture and
- 10 the effort to convince them and to like them in the
- 11 interrogation, it was a continuation from M-13. As for other
- 12 matters, it was consistent with the security offices of the Khmer
- 13 Rouge across the country.
- 14 I say that it was the same throughout the country. It does not
- 15 mean that I saw every places but, as I heard, it was the same.
- 16 They were the same; for example, the method of execution, way of
- 17 beating people up, especially the most important thing which
- 18 introduced by Division 703 that consider as their works or their
- 19 reputation at S-21 was the techniques in making arrest, because
- 20 they were in a special unit. The execution method was one of
- 21 their specialties.
- 22 As for the detention method and other methods I saw, I saw the
- 23 detention method was a continuation of the police security office
- 24 from Division 703 as long as other security office across the
- 25 country, but the difference between other security offices are

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- 1 the produce of the confession. This is the clear differences
- 2 between those security offices.
- 3 [16.12.51]
- 4 Q.There was therefore, all throughout Cambodia, security centres
- 5 that were applying the same methods. That's what you're telling
- 6 us. So according to you, why were you asked personally to take
- 7 on responsibilities in order to manage the S 21 centre? For
- 8 which reason were you selected to manage S 21?
- 9 A. Your Honours, I would like to confirm that this question was
- 10 asked by -- asked me by Judge Marcel Lemonde. I responded to him
- 11 based on my understanding at that time. I responded to Judge
- 12 Marcel Lemonde. I mentioned to him that I was the one who much
- 13 better in interrogation than Nat. However, as far as my
- 14 understanding now, it was not only that matter. Firstly, I am
- 15 better than Nat in terms of interrogation.
- 16 I taught the people to interrogate. I did it better than that.
- 17 This is true. I do not deny that. But if I go back to that
- 18 situation, the Party did not trust Nat, but the Party trusted me.
- 19 My superior, Son Sen, when Nat has left, he kept saying that Nat
- 20 was full of tactics, full of tricks. And they trusted in me
- 21 because I was honest to them, I can say. Bamboo would have a
- 22 partition. As for me, it could be compared to the leaf of onion.
- 23 I was very faithful to the Party. I would rather die if I had to
- 24 lie anyone.
- 25 [16.16.06]

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- So in conclusion, they assigned me to S-21 to replace Nat because
- 2 I was the one who is faithful or very honest to them. That's all
- 3 my response.
- 4 Q.You spoke about an answer that you had provided during one of
- 5 your interrogations with Judge Marcel Lemonde. So I'm going to
- 6 read an excerpt of your interview which is indexed as D-11 of the
- 7 file, and your answer in French is on page 3 of this interview,
- 8 and the ERN number is the following, 001417894. I do not have
- 9 the numbers for the Khmer or English versions, however, but I
- 10 will read and then maybe somebody will be able to complete it.
- 11 Well, in fact, the following question was put to you:
- 12 "Why did Nat -- why was Nat replaced?"
- 13 That was the question.
- 14 "And the official reason was that he had to go supervise the
- 15 communication -- the Military Communications Unit for the entire
- 16 country and he was not competent to be an interrogator, but he
- 17 was good at military matters because previously he had been a
- 18 division leader. This was the reason why he was replaced and I
- 19 had skills in terms of interrogating and I had been doing this
- 20 since 1971. And furthermore, Nat did not want to do this
- 21 interrogation work and I had the impression that even if I hated
- 22 and still hated this police work and interrogations, I had to do
- 23 this job, and I was doing it better than Nat. I had to do it.
- 24 That was unavoidable. It was an order and I had to do this
- 25 work."

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- 1 The package that you are referring to, is that so?
- 2 A. Your Honours, the words -- all the words you read were from my
- 3 heart that responded to Judge Lemonde. I clearly remember that I
- 4 respond another word saying the superior making a decision to
- 5 remove Nat, I don't know. This is the statement that I responded
- 6 to Judge Lemonde.
- 7 [16.31.01]
- 8 In addition, there is another incident. Maybe Your Honour did
- 9 not read that -- through that portion. I proposed my superior --
- 10 my superior Son Sen to take Chhay Kim Huor to replace me in
- 11 replacement of Nat and I wanted to continue to be a deputy. I
- 12 would like to confirm to Your Honour that Chhay Kim Huor was also
- 13 one of the students of Son Sen who was educated by Son Sen ahead
- 14 of me. He was one of the students of Son Sen who gets educated
- in communism far before me.
- 16 Chhay Kim Huor educated me to understand communism. Therefore,
- 17 when Son Sen asked me to supervise S-21, I was terrified and it
- 18 was the time when I contested such offer, but I did not really
- 19 contest right in front of him, but I -- openly, I just would like
- 20 Brother Kim Huor -- Chhay Kim Huor to become the chairperson
- 21 instead.
- 22 Then Son Sen threatened me. This morning, I already told you
- 23 about this. He said, "What the hell was it? How big was S-21?"
- 24 And by hearing that, I was compelled to continue taking the
- 25 offer. No further contest.

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[16.24.15]
In conclusion, the wording as read out by Your Honour was the
statement I made before the Co-Investigating Judges. They are
correct.
However, at this moment, when I recall the situation, I could say
that the upper echelon trusted me, but they did not have good
faith in Nat. So simply, I was like their "Berger" or dog.
MR. PRESIDENT:
It is now time to adjourn for the day, so the hearing is now
adjourned and the session will be resumed tomorrow at 9 a.m.
Security personnel are instructed to take the accused back to the
detention facility and bring him here before 9 a.m.
Parties and public are also informed to come back to tomorrow's
session before 9 a.m.
(Judges exit courtroom)
